In Part 9 of the DSE schedule, multicast station WKBT-2 was reported as distant in several subscriber groups. However, it seems this station was not reported as distant in Space G and Part 2 of the DSE schedule.

In addition, there were no gross receipts reported in the fourteenth subscriber group.

Lastly, it seems several broadcast stations were reported as permitted and non-permitted in some subscriber groups. For example, broadcast stations KSTP, KMSP, and KARE were reported as non-permitted and permitted in the RNS2 (13th group).
