OVER \$100,000 WORTH OF STOCK SOLD

TREADWELL, March 27.—The amount of Alaska-Juneau stock purchased by the employees of the Treadwell and allied companies up until noon today was slightly in excess of \$100,000, according to a statement made by James Christie, head of the office force at Treadwell.

Employees, according to the terms granted by the company, are allowed to buy the stock at \$10 per share, paying only \$2 per share in cash and the remainder at the rate of \$1 per share per month, for eight months.

MINING ACTIVE IN FAIRBANKS DISTRICT

FAIRBANKS, March 6.—The mining outlook on Goldstream and its rich upper tributaries in the Fox district looks very bright at the present time with the prospect for more work being done this coming summer than was accomplished last. Even now, when from two to two and a half feet of snow covers the valley and hillside, the landscape shows a continuous line of plants in action as far up the creek as the eye can reach.

Hundreds of cords of wood are piled along the railway tracks and one in that district complains of quiet times. There are no very large outfits working, but a great number of small ones, keeping the miners busy, either taking out pay now or preparing to take it out as soon as the winter breaks.

On Goldstream the following outfits are taking out winter dumps: Junkin Brothers on Robert Staples ground at Discovery claim.

William Flanagan, prospecting up per end of 1 below; a three-man outfit.

Schmidt & Co., traction between 1 and 2 below.

Craig & Co., on 2 below.

Morgan Bros., working blue men on 2 below, Gilmore station.

Hulse & Co., with a small crew on 2 below discovery.

Gjenson & Co., also small outfit, 4 below.

Charles Williams, operating also on 4 below discovery.

Melenius on the Bigelow bench, working 5 or 6 men.

Whitman & Co., on the same bench with about the same size crew.

White Bros., on 8 below discovery.

Vallet Brothers, on 8 below also.

Johnson, Freeman & Jarvis, 11 below discovery.

Cummins Brothers, 12 below discovery.

Bob Dunn, 14 below discovery, working ten or twelve men regularly.

All of these outfits, with two exceptions, are using steam plants, the two others having windlasses.

On Discovery, Pedro creek, the Hakst Brothers are making preliminary preparations for extensive open-cut work this summer. They will use the new ingenious scraper-bucket combined in the course of patent by them. It has just been completed in the shops of the Samson Hardware Co. in this city and will be installed just as soon as possible.

James McPike has laid in a big supply of wood for summer work on his extensive ground on Pedro, also Julius Gius and Harry Atwood.

Further down at Gilmore station, Koch, Cullinane & Karrison will open cut on 2 below Goldstream. Fred Bieker on 5 below and Henry Wagner just below him again. All of these open cut operators have plenty of good ground left and will start early and work late this coming season.

Charles Gius has something like 500 cords of wood hauled to his ground on Gilmore creek.

Of course there will be a number of smaller outfits working and the total number will increase as the mild spring weather approaches when it is practicable to do more out of doors. Goldstream will be there with the results this year, as always, supporting the busy little town of Fox and contributing to good business in Fairbanks and the country generally. — (Fairbanks News-Miner)

THE SEA OF MORMORA A statement by the National Geographical Society with reference to the Sea of Marmora, which is the connecting link between the Dardanelles and Bosphorus, says: "With the strongest fleet ever assembled for battle reported fighting its way through the Dardanelles toward the Sea of Marmora, the quiet Turkish sheet of water suddenly has taken on a thrilling world importance for its area may soon witness the last scenes of the mighty struggle of centuries for the preservation of Europe from the marauding effects of Eastern aggression. "Nature has been more than generous to her provisions for guarding this sea between Asia and Europe against hostile power. The Bosphorus, its approach from the Black Sea on the North, is a deep water-filled twisting valley, whose surface almost all the way is at the mercy of the enclosing mountain heights. In the South, the Dardanelles, while of great

or broader than the Bosphorus, form an easily defended channel, 47 miles long, and commanded by its shore heights. "Marmora Sea is a wonderful amphitheatre for a modern naval struggle. It is enclosed by a fully shore line, which is bold and steep upon the Asiatic side. From East to West the sea is 175 miles long, while its extreme width is about 50 miles. It has an area of 4,500 square miles. "Constantinople, the objective of the invading fleet, lies tucked away near the northernmost point of Marmora, at the opening of the Bosphorus outlet. In the west and south are several considerable islands, of which the largest, Marmora, has been famous for its marbles since the days of the Grecian sculptural and architectural glory. "The Sea of Marmora is the most famous and important sea of passage in the world. Behind its waters, and along the Northern shore of the Black Sea, are the most fertile and favored provinces of the Russian Empire. Russia's granary, while on the Black Sea coast lies Russia's greatest oil port and her famous oil-bearing hinterland. This Turk-dominated sea is the most important avenue of central Asia's raw materials to western transport and of the West's manufactures for consumption in the central East."

The London Post's Budapest correspondent says: "The misery of the people here cannot be described. Those who are in the employment of the government receive only half their former salaries and this also applies to all employees. Many laborers are only receiving one-quarter of their former salaries. Fancy living on quarter of one's salary when prices have advanced from 100 per cent. to 300 per cent. In the suburbs one can hear every day of rioting and of the attacking of bakers' and grocers' shops by frantic women, but one can hear such things only from neighbors or in the cafes and never read anything about it in the papers."

Former Minister of the Interior of Germany, Martin, in pamphlet "The World War and its End," predicts a German victory with the Kaiser dictating terms of peace in London two years hence. He estimates the war indemnity at \$25,000,000,000. He sees Germany established along the coast of France in a position to control both Paris and London with a tunnel under the English channel. Belgium a part of Germany, the Turks in possession of the Suez canal and Russia completely dismembered and almost bankrupt. Also that Egypt and Serbia will be under the rule of Austria-Hungary. He urges the invasion of England with thousands of aeroplanes.
