ARGENTINE BATTLESHIP COLLIDES WITH BARGE

PHILADELPHIA, March 29.—The new Argentine battleship Morena, which sailed for Hampton Roads from Philadelphia, collided Friday night with a barge on the Delaware river off Newcastle. The barge was sunk. The battleship ran ashore and remained aground until 7:30 Saturday morning when she was floated and proceeded on her way apparently undamaged.

FRENCH PREPARING FOR SPRING CAMPAIGNS

LONDON, March 29.—A Paris special says that the French in preparation for the Spring offensive have amassed a store of 25,000,000 shells, enough to carry on a sustained attack for two or three months.

FORMER YUKONER KILLED IN WAR

NEW YORK, March 29.—William L. Breeze, former secretary to Ambassador Walter H. Page in London, was killed March 25 in the fighting on the French front, according to advice received here from London today. Mr. Breeze was an officer in the Royal Horse Guards.

GERMANY IS SHORT OF COPPER

LONDON, March 29.—It is rumored that Germany is so short of copper that hundreds of agents have been sent through Asia Minor and Syria to buy up all copper kettles and pots they can find, which have been used in those countries for centuries, and are very heavy, as they are beaten out by hand.

AVIATOR ATTACKS CALAIS EARLY TODAY

CALAIS, March 29.—A German "tube" dropped many bombs in this city this morning at the breakfast hour. The aeroplane approached from the English channel, flying from a Belgian base.

AVIATOR KILLS THREE CHILDREN IN FRANCE

PARIS, March 29.—The French war office announced today that a German aviator dropped bombs upon the little town of Willer, northwest of Thann, and killed three children.

SEATTLE MAN DECLARES WAR ON TAXICAB DRIVERS

SEATTLE, March 29.—Michael Boyle wrote a letter last night to Police Judge John B. Gordon saying that he intended to kill the first Seattle Taxicab Company driver that he met. This morning he took three shots at E. L. Hampton, one of the drivers, but all of them went wild. Boyle surrendered.

TURKEY DENIES ATROCITIES.

WASHINGTON, March 29.—American Ambassador Henry Morgenthau, cabling to the State Department from Constantinople today, says the Turkish government denies that there has been any disorder at Urmiah, Perah, or that the Turkish troops have committed atrocities against Christians in either Persia or Asia Minor.

CHILEANS TO INVESTIGATE GERMAN DRESDEN CHARGES

VALPARAISO, Chile, March 29.—A commission has been sent by the Chilean government to Juan Fernandez Island to investigate the German charges that the Dresden was attacked and sunk in neutral waters, while at anchor in Cumberland bay on the north side of the island. The Germans allege that British shots damaged other ships in the harbor.

GERMANY STOPS PLANS FOR BELGIAN COLONY

ST. PAUL, Minn., March 29.—The plans for the establishment of a colony of Belgian farmers in Northern Minnesota received a setback when it became known that the German military authorities have refused permission to Belgium subjects to leave that country.

GEN. VON KLUCK IS WOUNDED.

BERLIN, March 29.—Gen. Von Kluck, commander of the German right wing, was wounded yesterday while inspecting the advanced positions of his army in Northern France.

FRENCH KILL AND WOUND COUNTRYMEN IN ALSACE

BERLIN, March 29.—Eleven French civilians were killed and 22 wounded when a French aviator dropped bombs upon Strassburg and villages in Alsace today, according to a report of the war office.
