WILL TAX BY DIRECT LEVY PLAN

Mr. Sulzer said that he did not want to take snap judgment on a revenue program that he had heard today for the first time. "There is \$500,000 involved in this matter, and it is something that everyone should have a voice in," he said. "This affects the entire Territory of Alaska, and may continue to do so for years to come."

Senate to Study Draft. The motion of Senator Millard was withdrawn, and typewritten copies of the draft will be made, for study by the Senate. Two days were agreed upon as the limit for considering the bill, as Senator Millard pointed out that the session was half over, and the great volume of business was yet not disposed of.

The revenue draft provides a Board of Taxation and Equalization, with the Governor, Treasurer and Secretary as members. An assessor shall be appointed from each division, but these officials shall be elected at the next general election. Listing of property owners will be made compulsory under its provisions.

License Plan, Too. The House this afternoon, continuing in the committee of the whole, passed a motion to have the revenue committee submit the license tax system when its bill is reported, but it was indicated that the direct tax system would eventually be adopted. The licensing system was adopted in 1913.

Mr. Noon wanted the canneries, and their machinery and improvements taxed, he said, in addition to the same course in regarding to mining. Mr. Heckman said the canneries were perfectly willing to pay a property tax, but, he argued, the product tax, if the Territory levies a tax on case-salmon, would be opposed on the theory that double taxation is unconstitutional.

He pointed out the Federal tax of four cent a case. He estimated the cannery investments in Alaska to be \$12,000,000.

Physician Asks Money. The Governor sent a message to the House and Senate, containing a letter from W. T. Thompson, M.D., of Center, Wash., who asked compensation in the sum of \$250 for handling an epidemic of measles at Afognak, Alaska, in 1913.

He said there were 289 patients, and that he was entitled to some pay for his work. He also asked that Charles Jones, an assistant he compensated in the sum of \$25. The letter was referred to the ways and means committee.

SUIT FOR ATTORNEY FEES IN THE DISTRICT COURT District court today was occupied with the Cobb-Dalton case, in which J. H. Cobb sues for services alleged to have been rendered to Jack Dalton.

J. H. Cobb alleged in his complaint that he had acted as attorney for Jack Dalton from the year 1908 to 1912, that he had secured patents to lode claims near Cordova, for him and defended him against the adverse claims of the Katalla company and the C. R. & N. W. R. R. Co., and performed other legal services for him during those years for which he averred the defendant was indebted to him in the sum of \$4,500 and costs.

The defendant, Dalton, through his attorneys, Hollenthal & Hollenthal, set up a contract between himself and Cobb, by which Cobb was to share in the profits of the various transactions with him, and did share with him to the extent of \$600, he alleged.

INDICTMENT DISMISSED BY JUDGE JENNINGS The secret indictment brought in August 1913, against Albert Mathison, of the Guano Commercial company of Killisnoo, was quashed in the district court this morning and the defendant discharged. Though three terms of court had passed since the indictment was returned, Mathison was never cited to appear and knew nothing of the charge against him of selling lemon and other extracts to Indians.

Judge Robert W. Jennings characterized such proceedings as "contrary to the constitution of the United States, the federal statutes, of the spirit of the law, and of common decency and fair play," and ordered the indictment dismissed and the defendant discharged.
