HERRING REDUCTION IS VITAL SAYS WAKEFIELD

leading operators about Kodiak this year came to 17,500 barrels of herring. There are four reduction plants.
The percentage of big herring as obtained at Kodiak does not apply elsewhere. In Southeastern Alaska not more than a single per cent can be barreled.

Good Paydays
Small herring are not necessarily young fish, any more than a Jersey cow is a calf, said Mr. Wakefield, who promoted the first modern plant in Alaska, at Port Walter.
There were 64 people employed at the Port Wakefield plant this season, the smallest payday for any fisherman being \$1,400 for three months work. Women employees brought from Seattle were paid \$300 and all expenses, traveling and sustenance. Alaska plant workers were paid 10c per barrel more than the outsiders.

At one time the biggest salmon packer in the country, Mr. Wakefield has since branched out into herring. He also operated a salmon plant at Ketchikan, as the J. L. Smiley Co., was head of the Alaska Herring and Sardine Co., the Baranoff Packing Co. and the Franklin Packing Co. On Puget Sound he got his big start in salmon as head of the Apex cannery at Anacortes.
