The great list of second-class passengers that are arriving on each boat that comes into Skagway has caused many to believe that this city is not being overlooked by the crooks in their trek from Seattle.

Speaking of the situation at Juneau, the Record-Miner says:

"There was landed here off the Portland, last night, about a dozen hard looking creatures that will deserve close watching. It would be well for every householder to be on his guard. Now that we have had shooting scrapes, suicides and throat cutting, it follows that burglaries are sure to follow. Seattle has determined that these thugs should not remain there and they are scattering in all directions. Juneau is getting her share. A good gun close at hand these nights will do much toward stopping the depredations of these thieves and cut-throats."

The peace officers of Skagway have been watching the situation closely, and are daily notifying suspicious characters to get a job or move on quickly.

Comisky, who caused an international excitement by pretending to possess knowledge of the destruction by the Canadian police of the Russian boundary monuments on the Dalton trail, may be serving time in the Skagway jail within another week. Deputy Marshal Snook left Skagway on the City of Seattle for Hoonah, where it is said Comisky is now residing with the Indians, for the purpose of placing him under arrest.

Comisky has been a fugitive from justice for more than two years. He was arrested here charged with selling liquor to Indians, and released on his own recognizance. At the trial, his attorney appeared for him, and he was convicted and fined \$200. He has never shown up, and the fine remains unliquidated.
