She was first married to Andrew Dolan, and after his death, to Geo. McClendon, who preceded her to the grave many years ago. She leaves only grand children and great grand children to mourn her death. She devoted a great portion of time to the work of the Master, and died with the hope of eternal peace. A large concourse of friends followed her remains to Chapel Hill, where she was interred. The BEE extends sympathy to the bereaved ones.
