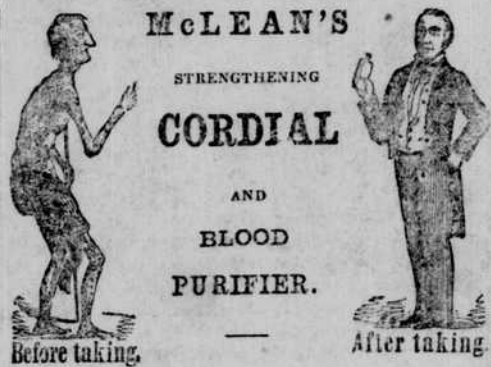

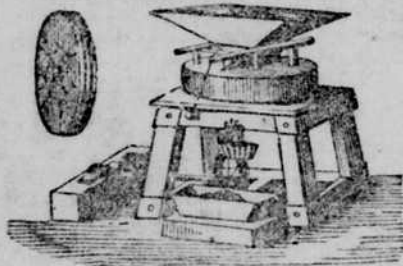

\$1,000 Reward.

I WILL give Eight hundred dollars reward for the apprehension and delivery of Peter P. Pitchlynn, Jr., to the civil authorities of Sevier county, Arkansas.

The Governor of the State of Arkansas has issued his proclamation offering \$200 reward on the part of the State making \$1,000 altogether.

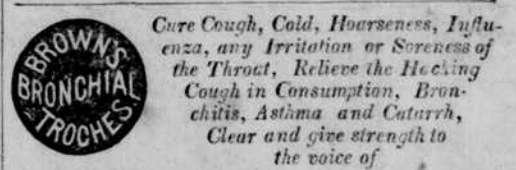
THERE was committed to the
