HIGHWAY BUILDING.

The question of the construction of a splendid highway between Hot Springs and Mt. Ida on the plan of "Forty Miles a Week" is not without precedent.

It is forty miles between the cities. One week of enthusiastic labor will complete the job. It should be no trouble to get up a subscription for the work from those who are interested. Both Garland and Montgomery counties will do their part as counties.

The land owners along the route will furnish mule teams and wagons and hands for a week.

County Judge Farmer will join with others in the supervision of the work so that the greatest good can be accomplished in the short period of actual labor. The route should be gone over carefully.

The first thing that should be done is for the Business Men's League here to name a small committee to co-operate with Judge Farmer as the head of the movement.

A trip will have to be made over the route, when it can be definitely ascertained just how much help can be depended upon from all sources, and an estimate can also be made of how much work will be required, and where the most of it must be placed.

Then, after these preliminaries, one week should be designated for carrying out the work—not designated too far in advance but selected with a view to good weather so the work will not be interrupted.

This is no gigantic task if all forces will work together for the common end, and if they do the "Forty Miles a Week" scheme will be carried to completion in a manner that will not alone be greatly beneficial to both cities, but will prove a public announcement of the fact that this district is not a divided section ranking with prejudices, but a unit for the building and success of the interests of all its people.

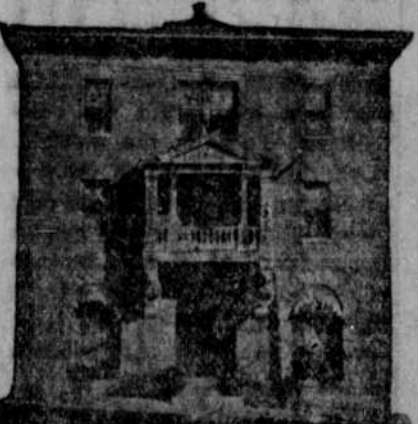
