



TOM BENTON, (alias UNCAS.)

WILL stand the coming season at the stable of the undersigned, in Little Rock, commencing the 1st of April, and ending the 1st of July, and will be let to mares at the reduced price of twenty dollars the season, ten dollars the single leap, payable at the expiration of the season, or thirty dollars to ensure a mare with foal payable as soon as the mare is known to be with foal, the property in the same be changed. TOM BENTON is a beautiful dark brown, with black legs, mane, and tail, without any natural white about him—full fifteen hands three inches high—well proportioned—fine bone, sinew, and muscular form, and will be eight years old this spring.

PEDIGREE.

TOM BENTON was bred in Sumner county, Tennessee, and was sired by Gen. Robert Desha's race horse John Randolph; he by Oscar; Oscar by Wilkes' Wonder; Wonder by imported Blomsted, out of the dam of Pacolat. John Randolph's dam was full sister to Oscar, out of Rosey Clark. (For the pedigrees and performances of Oscar, Rosey Clark, and Wilkes' Wonder, you are referred to the American Turf Register.) Tom Benton's dam was got by Grey Dunsnon; he by old Dunsnon. His grand dam by Tryall; he out of the dam of the celebrated race mare Maria, owned by Capt. Haynie, of Sumner county, Tennessee, supposed to be the best animal of her day, from one to four mile heats. I deem it unnecessary to go into details of Tom Benton's performance on the turf, as it has altogether been confined to Arkansas, and almost all the individuals fond of the turf are well acquainted with it. Since the fall of 1835, he has run five races, from one mile out to one mile and repeat, two miles and repeat, and two races of three miles and repeat—beating easily all but the last three mile heat, when it was evident that he was in very bad condition.

Taking into consideration Tom Benton's fine size, superior blood, and extraordinary performances on the turf, I can, with confidence recommend him as a horse which is equal, if not superior, to any in the State.
