These Indians have been very bold for years in their depredations against the cattlemen and they have killed or driven off hundreds of head and all efforts of the stockmen have so far failed.

A party of local nimrods went to Mariposa canyon Wednesday morning at 3 o'clock and put in the day hunting. They killed many doves and blue rock pigeons and had a very pleasant outing. George Jones came near killing a bear he saw its tracks in the sand near a water hole. Those who went were: Dr. F. H. Welles, J. B. Mix, Geo P Jones and Johnny Gibson. MEXICAN ANNIVERSARY.

The Sixteenth of September to be Duly Celebrated.

The Mexican celebration committee for the 16th of September held a meeting at the Nogales, Sonora, municipal hall last Monday evening with Mr. Rodolfo O'arria, as presiding chairman, and the following members present: Messrs. Mascareñas, Villaseñor, Paredes, Chapital, Raphael, Encinas, Martinez, Duplat, Garza Cortina, Ramirez and Secretary Acevedo.

Messrs. Chapital and Paredes of the collection committee, reported excellent progress as to the subscription list which was generously subscribed to by citizens on both sides of the line and that there was but a small balance uncollected. The report was approved and funds on hand ordered deposited with Treasurer Sandoval.

Messrs. Garza Cortina and Raphael were appointed as a special committee to draft and present a full report of the programme with all the necessary detail to be carried out for the celebration of the 15th and 16th.

The committee was instructed to extend a cordial invitation to the Ladies Orchestra of Nogales, requesting their kind cooperation at the literary and musical exercises during the festive day.

Mr. Mascareñas moved that the grand ball for the occasion be given at the custom house, as that locality was the only one sufficiently large enough to accommodate the vast assemblage of invited guests. Carried by acclamation.

It was ordered that the committee on fireworks shall take immediate action to purchase the best possible exhibition display from the funds set aside for that purpose. Motion approved.

Before adjournment and with the unanimous consent of the members of the committee, the further consideration and appointment of committees for the civic programme and grand ball were deferred until the next meeting set for Thursday the 26th, at 8 o'clock p. m. to which date, the meeting duly adjourned. An account of that meeting cannot be given till our next issue.
