Press dispatches report that the government placed an order recently for 14 new areoplanes for use on the border. Doesn't that seem like a measly order in view of the fact that we are about to enter upon a war in which a large army operating along a line of several hundred miles will soon be engaged? Why not make the order 140 and have something to start with?

While the submarine and aeroplane have not played as important a part in the European war as many thought they would play, they have played a conspicuous part and with further development of these war machines and in the methods of using them they are likely to effect a radical change in modes of warfare.

A Unique Logging Railroad
The Sacramento Mountain Lumber Company will install unique logging railroads to handle logs from its large body of pine and fir timber on the Alamo National Forest. The logs will be conducted by overhead cables. Instead of following canyon bottoms, the logging railroads will follow the ridges. The cables will be stretched across the canyons, and the logs will be lifted out of the canyons instead of being pulled down the slopes. It is said that this operation will mean a revival of prosperity for the Sacramento Mountain region, the former lumber mills having been closed down for ten years.

PLAN ADOPTED IN SALT RIVER VALLEY

That an agricultural community is a business enterprise which should be conducting its farming along systematic business-like lines is a fundamental principle which has been recently recognized by the farmers and business men of Salt River Valley, Arizona, in adopting a plan for its agricultural development. A comprehensive plan providing for an agricultural development covering a long period of years and based on a careful analysis of farming and economic conditions was prepared by Prof. Stanley F. Morse, superintendent of the agricultural extension

service of the University of Arizona and county agent leader, U. S. department of agriculture and presented to a small committee of representative farmers, land-owners and business men for consideration. After a series of meetings this plan with modifications was brought before the advisory council of the Maricopa County Farm Improvement Association and adopted. This provides for making the Maricopa County Farm Improvement Association (composed of all the farmers and business organizations in the county) the central organizations through which all matters agricultural will be handled. The work of strengthening this organization and getting the farmers to thoroughly cooperate and standardize their products will be under the direction of a high-class farm advisor who will soon be employed (the present incumbent having just resigned). A marketing specialist is also to be employed to make a careful marketing survey and prepare a plan for a marketing corporation. Ten thousand dollars is to be raised for carrying out the plan, the funds to come from the University of Arizona, U. S. department of agriculture, county of Maricopa, farmers' organizations and private subscriptions. With the backing of everyone concerned it is believed that eventually the agriculture of the Salt River Valley will be handled like the business of any great corporation with \$100,000,000 invested.
