**EDITORIAL PARAGRAPHS.**

"Tom" still hangs out, on Main St., and is always on hand for cash.

We notice the arrival in town, of Lieut. Calhoun from Camp Grant.

Mr. Newton Israel, from Camp Grant, arrived in town during the week. The crops, he says, in that section of the San Pedro valley, look well and promise an abundant harvest.

A sudden change in the condition of the atmosphere, about the middle part of last week, occasioned much sickness. We have been informed that two deaths occurred during the week.

Much rain has fallen during the past week, but again the weather has become clear and sultry; vegetation is therefore very rapid, and the prospects of those who cultivate farms are very flattering.

The new brick building, of Leopoldo Carillo, on Main street, overtops every other building in Tucson. The singular construction of the upper story of this building renders it difficult for one to decide as to the real purpose for which it is intended.

By private letter from Las Cruces, N. M., we are informed that a Catholic college for girls is about to be erected at that place. Father Juan Salpanta, recently vicar of this place, will preside over the churches of Doña Ana.

We would call attention to an advertisement in to-day's issue regarding the sale of 120 shares of the capital stock of the Pinos Altos Mining Company. This is a rare chance for good investment.

Messrs DAVIS & BARELLA, sub-contractors for the U. S. mail, between here and La Mesilla, N. M., arrived here on Friday. This contract for the transportation of mail matter between these points has passed into the right hands at last, as may be seen by reference to their schedule time—there being nothing on record surpassing their punctuality.

We would call attention to a notice in another column of the sale at auction, of the property of Charles Hardenburg. This property is conveniently situated for a private residence and, on the second of April, will be given over to the highest bidder. Think well, you who want to start into life, here is a chance for a good home at a low figure.

A private letter to a citizen of this place from Jno. G. Capron, states that the citizens of San Diego have subscribed a sum of \$6,000 for building the new wagon road between that place and Fort Yuma. Mr. C. is about to start for San Francisco with a view of raising more funds, to be applied to the speedy completion of this road, which it is said, will reduce the price of freight one hundred per cent.

We have received the February number of "Every Month," a Magazine of Universal Literature, published by C. H. Jones & Co., 108 Fulton St., New York. The premiums offered to clubs, subscribing for this magazine, surpass anything we have ever seen proposed for a like purpose.

Mr. Jarvenillo arrived from New Mexico about the beginning of last week. He brought a train of wagons laden with general merchandise and established himself in the newly finished building of Leopoldo Carillo, on the east side of Main St. There are now in Tucson, fourteen large wholesale and retail establishments, exclusive of liquor stores.

The following are the names of the successful bidders for the commissary contracts, which were received and awarded on the 15th instant: 150,000 pounds flour awarded J. P. T. Carter, Secretary of the Territory and acting governor of Arizona at 8 41-100 cts. 20,000 pounds of beans, to Lord & Williams, Merchants, Tucson, at 5 1/2 cts. 9,000 pounds of salt, to Pedro Aguirre, of Altar, at 6 99-100 cts per pound in U. S. gold coin.

The express rider from Apache Pass arrived here on Tuesday, but brought no Eastern mail. He reports that the mails failed to connect in consequence of some stock, belonging to the road, having been run off by Indians near the Miembres. The Western mail was hardly more fortunate. The driver, Mr. Johnson, was fired upon and wounded, on Monday last, by an ambuscade of Indians, at or near the Picocho. He was upon his outward trip when thus assailed and was obliged to return to Tucson. His wound, though it may disable him for a time, will not, it is thought, lead to any serious consequences.

Our town was thrown into quite a lively excitement on Thursday last, by a report that a train of wagons was attacked near the Picocho by about 150 Indians. A man arrived here from the Point of Mountain bringing this report, whereupon, Lieut. Winters with a company of cavalry and some mounted Infantry set out for the scene of the reported calamity. Upon their arrival they found everything quiet and were surprised to learn that no Indians had been seen by any of the party with the train. Later reports, however, corroborate the statement of the presence of Indians upon the route: upon Thursday evening the bodies of two Mexicans were found, about the place where the train was reported to have been attacked; They are believed to have been killed on Wednesday.

Col. C. W. Lewis Thos. M. Yerkes L. B. Wooster. A. C. Benedict and other gentlemen from Tubac have been in town through the week. Col. Lewis intends to start for Washington city soon accompanied by his lady, who came to isolated Arizona nearly a year since to sojourn with her distinguished husband but the climate of their locality not being well adapted to her health she prefers taking the Colonel back to their congenial home to enjoy again the luxury of that society. Arizona cannot well afford to lose such men as Col. Lewis, and we trust that after a season he will return and help to complete what has always been his aim while amongst us—the building up of Southern Arizona.

In consequence of our late Eastern dates being less important than usual, and a press of local matter on hand, we have omitted our usual column of "latest news."
