

**LIGHT DAWNING.**  
For years the people of Arizona have been trying to impress on their Eastern brethren an idea of the sufferings to which they have been subjected by the raids of the murderous Apache. The sickly sentimentality of the East has heretofore drowned every appeal sent up from this section, and rapine and murder has gone on at the will of Geronimo. Light, however, seems to be breaking, and already some of the most influential of Eastern journals look through the Apache glass from an Arizona standpoint. We recently published a forcible article from the Washington Critic, and now comes the St. Louis Globe-Democrat, one of the leading newspapers of the country, with the following commentary on the Indian situation. It says:

"If the people who protest against General Miles' offer of \$2,000 for the capture of the Apache Geronimo, dead or alive, and \$50 for each of his band, do so on the score of its extravagance, they are informed right here that each hostile Indian in the country costs the Government on an average about \$3,000 a year. This was the computation of a Government official a year or two ago. Of course, at this figure, the Government could afford to board all of them in first-class hotels, and give the weary soldiers who have been hunting them a much needed respite. If humanitarian sentiments inspire the protest, it would be well for the protestants to remember that the policy of humanitarianism has led to the cold-blooded murder of dozens of innocent persons by these Apache fiends in the past six months, and that these atrocities are still kept up. Every means of civilizing the Apache, except the one just adopted by General Miles, has been tried and all failed. The declaration that the only good Indian is the dead Indian is gospel when applied to Geronimo and his band.

No news is usually called good news, but no Indian news at the present juncture hardly comes under that category.

The Epitaph speaks of the "fine melodious organ" of Judge Barnes. What is it, a mouth organ, hand organ, or one of the organs of the decaying Arizona Democracy?

The press reports state that Senator Hearst is very "ired" of his new honors. We doubt very much if his weariness compares with that of the people of California in seeing him with the Senatorial toga on.

There is an absolute dearth of news concerning the shames of Geronimo and his band of cutthroats. Nothing has been heard of them for five days. It is barely possible that the activity with which General Miles has been pursuing them has driven them from the Territory to seek safety amid the recesses of the Sierra Madre.

This evening, in the White House, will occur the wedding of Stephen Brewer Cleveland, President of the United States, and Miss Folson. Although the union is on between May and December, the Turkish press trusts it may prove a happy one, and that when the ceremony is over, from the cares of office on the 4th of March, 1887, he may have shown more energy for domestic bliss than he has in managing the Nation.

Supervisor John Montgomery is looming up as a strong candidate for Sheriff on the Republican ticket.

**Breaking up a Band of Rustlers.**

Waco Tex. June 1.—Sony Moseley a notorious horse-thief and escaped convict who has given the officers of McLennan county a great deal of trouble, was captured last night in Montague County. Moseley was convicted in Waco in 1884 for stealing horses and given seven years in the Penitentiary but he was taken away from his guards in November of the same year while he was at work on a convict farm in Grimes county. Since then he has given the officers many lively chases. He confessed to having stolen 100 head of horses in or around Waco. When captured he had nineteen head of horses and intended to drive them to Kansas and sell them.

Another notorious character named James Wilson also a McLennan County man was captured with Sony A negro named Starley who was also with Moseley made his escape but was captured in this city last night and today Sheriff McLane of Montague County came after him. This capture will do more to break up the Sony Moseley gang of rustlers and the rustlers than any thing which has ever occurred since it was organized.

**A Defaulting Cashier.**

Galveston Tex. June 1.—About two weeks ago a young man by the name of James Young who had been for some time prior employed as cashier in the Pacific Express office in this city disappeared very suddenly and mysteriously without having previously intimated to any one his intended departure. His defaulting under these circumstances led to an investigation of his accounts with the Express company in which he was found to be \$700 short. Up to the time of his sudden departure his honesty or business integrity was not in the least mentioned. He was, in fact considered a young man of exemplary business habits. Young was a native of Canada and on leaving Galveston directed his course that way but through the diligence of his bondsmen he was intercepted before crossing the international boundary and is now on his way back to Galveston. The Grand Jury now in a session has indicted him.

**Ex-Senator Stockton in the Race.**

Trenton June 1.—There has been a sudden change of sentiment among the representative Jersey Democrats concerning the gubernatorial nomination. Ex-Senator John P. Stockton is decidedly the favorite just now. Mr. Stockton says he will except the nomination if tendered to him with sufficient unanimity. It is the general opinion that Senator McPherson has promised to endorse Stockton's candidacy and that four-fifths of the Democratic party in the state consider him the best man for the nomination.

**Elopement with a Priest.**

Heckscherville Pa. June 1.—There is considerable excitement here upon the discovery that Rev. Father John S. Keul, the parish priest eloped last Saturday night to Philadelphia with Miss Maggie McDavitt a young and beautiful maiden whose parents designed placing her in a convent. It is understood that they have been married.

**No Tarriff Bill at this Session**

Washington June 1.—A special to the Baltimore American says: "Chairman Morrison states that Congress will adjourn during the first week in July. He is quoted as saying further that it was not his purpose to dispose of the Tarriff bill during this session, that it would come up next week and would give way from time to time for consideration of appropriation bills and when they are all out of the way Congress will adjourn leaving the Tarriff bill pending. This scheme will give Mr. Morrison the control of the House and is to be employed as he says 'to defeat vicious legislation.'"
