Arizona.  
The following interesting notes on Arizona in general, and this valley in particular, are copied from the Sacramento Record-Union:  
One great overland railway is pushing from your State through via Tucson to the Gulf of Mexico at the rate of one and one-half miles per day; the Southern Utah is pushing to our northern border; the Guaymas and Tucson road is expected to be extended from the California gulf this way 100 miles within the next twelve months; Atlixon, Topeka and Santa Fe is advancing southwestward, and without doubt will enter Arizona at some point; companies to construct interior lines are talked of under recent aid by the Legislature; new churches, schools and banking institutions are building and being opened; tons upon tons of young fruit trees and vines are now being received from abroad and planted; domestic animals of all kinds and of the best bloods are increasing rapidly and are flourishing in our mild climate, and on our rich and abundant grasses.  
Like Nevada, Utah, New Mexico and other sections of our mountainous and slightly timbered interior, Arizona would be better off if blessed with more surface water, yet there is much now running to waste in our valleys. Our system of irrigation is very imperfect—if it can be said that we have any system whatever; but as the mining population, stockgrowers, traders, people, mechanics and professionals increase and make a home demand for the products of the soil, the water of our streams will be made to irrigate millions more acres of land. It is one of the chief merits of Arizona that its agricultural capacity is equal to the wants of an immense non-producing population. The Gila River rises in New Mexico and runs through the Territory—a distance of nearly 400 miles, and on one or the other side, and at many places throughout its whole length on both sides, there is good agricultural land, and by an economical use of the water at least one crop can be produced every year and in many years two. Salt River rises in timbered mountains in the eastern part of the Territory, and emerges into a rich valley, in extent about 15 by 60 miles, before it unites with the Gila below Maricopa Wells. Salt river carries a large volume of water the year round, and especially is this true in the irrigating seasons. This valley is large and productive enough to sustain half a million people. And yet it contains but a few thousands, including Indians. Here it must be said that the unoccupied lands in this (Salt) valley have been withdrawn from pre-emption and sold by the President for the benefit of the Pima and Maricopa Indians; but this believing that the order making this sweeping withdrawal will be so modified as to permit settlement in the greater part of the valley, because the Indians have no use for but a small fraction of the land so withdrawn. Verde river rises north of Prescott and swings east of the town, and flows south and unites with Salt river below Camp McDowell. At nearly all points along it there is agricultural land, a small portion of which is occupied. Water never falls in this stream.  
**TERRITORIAL ITEMS.**  
Business of all kinds seems to be reviving and times seem to be rapidly improving in Prescott and vicinity.  
Wm. McMichael has been appointed postmaster at Cottonwood, and W. A. Rowe at Tiptop; and P. Thayer at the Silver King mine.  
Twelve citizens of Los Angeles came into Tucson week before last. Six more arrived on Saturday last, and ten more Monday morning.  
The Wide Awake prospecting and mining company have levied an assessment of four cents a share. The corporation is operating at Picket Post, Pinal county.  
Close connection is now being made at Maricopa Wells between the Tucson stages and those from Prescott and Phoenix. Stages leave Tucson at 4 p. m.; leave Phoenix at 1:30 p. m. The westward bound stages wait for them at Maricopa until 7 p. m. They leave Maricopa for Phoenix at 3 a. m.  
Klein has been notified to have his hotel at Maricopa in readiness next month for a party of excursionists which is going out there by rail. He has two long buildings at Dos Palpas which will soon be moved out on the railroad. He has full faith in the silver mines of the Papago country, and proposes to establish a first-class hotel at Gila Bend. Klein is one of the "boss" landlords.—Sciencist.
