Indications for Extension of S. P. Railroad.

Tucson, July 23d.—A telegram has just been received from Col. Gray, Chief Engineer of the Southern Pacific Railroad asking if Tucson authorities were ready for the company's attorney to come and examine the titles to the right of way inside the line of Tucson. A reply was sent for the attorney to come immediately. The titles will all be perfected by July thirtieth.  
A Boy Murdered.  
YUMA, July 23d.—A young Mexican named J. M. Ochoa was murdered at Peacacho Sunday. He was buried the same day. Mathews the murderer, was captured at Benigno's ranch, about 20 miles up the river from Neahr's mill. He was brought to Yuma and delivered to the military. The Sheriff of San Diego has telegraphed his arrest. Mathews weighs nearly 200 pounds. He says the boy was "sassy," and he struck him with a piece of fire wood, crushing in the skull.
