Eight Thousand Mill Hands
Strike—The Confederate
Reunion.

CLEVELAND GOES FISH-
ING.

General Happenings Through-
out the Country.

COLUMBUS, O.—Judge Meekeson was
nominated by the Democrats today
for congress. The "free and unlimited
coinage of gold and silver" was en-
dorsed.

CHICAGO.—The delegates who have
arrived generally appear averse to dis-
cussing the probability that Senator
Culler will out any figure in the demo-
cratic convention. The senator has a
number of personal friends among the
silver delegates who have already
arrived, who are not averse to his
nominations for president.

WILKESBARRE.—There are fifty-nine
men, living or dead, imprisoned in the
depths of the doomed mine. In the
afternoon the men reported that they
had reached the edge of the fallen
rock and begun to load it in cars. The
pit where men are supposed to be is
still 600 feet beyond.

MILZ, Germany.—A fire in the
arsenal near Fort Meesse, caused an
explosion which killed several persons
and seriously injured many.

NEW YORK.—A dispatch to the
World from Havana says:
The period within which, according
to General Weyler's edict, all country-
men in Pinar del Rio must go into the
towns or go to the insurgents' all who
are found in the country will be held
to be enemies. People are forbidden
to take out food from Artemisa.

VICKSBURG, Miss.—The following
private dispatch from New York states
in part the disposition by the river
commission of the allotments for
levees for two years \$2,250,000. The
lower Mississippi district receives the
first year \$200,000, the second year
\$600,000.

RICHMOND, Va.—The confederate re-
union opened yesterday with cham-
ping weather. An immense throng was
present. Gen. Gordon showed his face
on the rostrum when a mighty con-
federate yell went up. Gov. O'Ferrall
welcomed the veterans. Gen. Gordon
is orator of the occasion.

YACONCROSS, O.—Every mill in the
Mahoning valley, including Youngs-
town, Warren, Miles, Girard and
Struthers will close, pending the set-
tlement of a rate per ton for boiling.

Manufacturers offer to sign a scale at \$4 a ton while the amalgamated as- ociation is holding out for \$4.50. Eight thousand five hundred mill workers will be out of employment until a settlement is reached.

NEW YORK.—President Cleveland
arrived at Jersey City at 1 o'clock yester-
day afternoon. He immediately
embarked on a government tug which
conveyed him to E. C. Benedict's steam
yacht, Oneida, on which he will pro-
ceed to Buzzard's Bay.
