Alabama For Silver 50,000 Strong.

MISSOURI FOR SILVER TOO

Several Factories Resumes Work—A Fatal Collision—K. of P. Reunion.

BRYAN DECLINES TO SAY.

General Happenings Throughout the Country.

MONTGOMERY, Ala.—Returns from the state elections are just beginning to come in, and it is impossible now to give any figures. Reports so far show democratic gains and bear out the claims of the state committee, of Johnson's election by a much larger majority than Oates received two years ago. By a careful estimate at 10 p. m. reports received so far, Johnson has carried forty-eight counties and Goodwin fourteen with four in doubt. Johnson's apparent majority is about 50,000.

JEFFERSON CITY, Mo.—The advance guard of delegates to the Democratic convention which meets here today, has arrived. The silver men will control the convention by an overwhelming majority and no one will be nominated who differs with them concerning the white metal.

NILES, O.—The rolling mills of this place will resume work at once giving employment to about 20,000 men.

NEW YORK.—The headquarters of the treasurer of the Democratic national committee and treasurer of the silver party's national committee, were opened for business at the Barthold Hotel today. W. P. St. John will be in charge.

PROVIDENCE, R. I.—Allen's printing works started up today after three week's shutdown. The concern employs 300 men.

CHICAGO.—Governor Altgeld asserted today that he had no desire to be attorney general in Bryan's cabinet, and declared there was no truth whatsoever in the story that he had made a bargain with Mr. Bryan to receive the portfolio in return for the support of the Illinois delegation in the convention.

ROME CITY, Ind.—A monster reunion of the Michigan and Indiana Knights of Pythias will be held tomorrow. The attendance will probably reach 10,000.

LINCOLN, Neb.—Bryan tonight declined to be interviewed on the rumor that he would decline the populist nomination. "I have nothing to add," he said, "to the statement which I gave out at the close of the convention."

TOPEKA, Kan.—The Santa Fe passenger train due in this city at 4:27 this afternoon collided with an east bound local passenger train near Bean Lake, Mo., shortly before noon today. One person was killed and eight injured.
