The Democratic party of Cochise county, Arizona, in convention assembled, hereby reaffirm our belief in and allegiance to the time honored principles of Democracy, and do unqualifiedly endorse the Democratic National Platform adopted in Chicago, and Democratic territorial platform as adopted at Williams, and the national and territorial tickets, and we congratulate the people that after the most strenuous attempts to subvert those traditions and principles, by those high in power and in the interests of the money lenders of Europe, the Democratic party has risen in its might and cast out such traitors and has forced them into the party of plutocracy, corporations, and assassins of labor headed by Mark Hanna and his gang, where they properly belong, and where they are receiving the hearty support and co-operation of every monopoly and corruptionist in our country.

We congratulate ourselves and the whole people that every industrial society and all parties which sincerely believe in our government returning to the money of our fathers and the constitution, are with us today in this mighty struggle for the emancipation of sixty millions of white slaves from the corrupting influences of gold monometalism, and that there is every reason to believe from the signs of the times, that the machinery of this government will again soon be placed in the hands of the people.

We believe the free and unlimited coinage of silver is the paramount and overshadowing principle of the present campaign, and that no person should be elevated to office or position of power who does not believe in such free coinage by our own government, without waiting for the consent or assistance of other nations for we chafe that it was the corrupting influences in Europe which forced upon its people gold monometalism and thereby reduced the wage earners to serfdom; and the same people who wrought such havoc there, are attempting to do the same thing here, and to our sorrow, they have partially succeeded; thereby reducing the majority of our own people to financial slavery, and impoverishing every producer of wealth in the United States.

The contraction of the currency, of our country, by the demonization of silver was the most gigantic and heinous crime ever perpetrated on any people in the history of the whole world; and those responsible for it are traitors to freedom and Republican institutions, and those who would now seek to maintain the present miserable condition of our own people by the maintenance of the present gold standard, are offering every opportunity in an expansion of currency for the alleviation of the sufferings of humanity, are parties to that great crime, in sympathy with the influence which seeks to establish on the ruins of our government a plutocracy; or, they are deceived and misled by the glittering falsehoods circulated by the enemies of the people—the money changers of the east.

We pledge our party that every nominee of this convention is a free silver man who endorses every sentiment of this platform, and we ask the endorsement of their candidates by the people; and we pledge to the people a more economical administration of territorial and county affairs than has characterized our government for the past two years; and that no more revenue shall be raised by taxation than is required for the maintenance of our county government economically administered, and that the revenue raised shall not be diverted for and other purpose than the strict administration of county government. In asking the co-operation of the people, we pledge an efficient, honest and economical administration.

Tombstone, Ariz., Oct. 8th, 1896.
MR. CHAIRMAN—We, your committee, respectfully submit the following resolutions for the consideration of the convention:

Resolved, That we most heartily endorse the principles of the Republican party as enunciated by those great leaders—Lincoln, Seward and Chase—and that we pledge ourselves to maintain and support the doctrines of the party as set forth by them. And we especially call the attention of the people of the land to the advice given to the nation in his farewell address by that patriot, soldier and statesman, George Washington, as it is of particular significance at this time, and these are the words: "Beware of foreign influence, as the most baneful foe of a Republican government." We therefore condemn, and reject as un-American and unworthy of acceptance, any suggestion of submitting anything appertaining to American affairs to a foreign conference, believing that we are fully able to defend our country and protect ourselves.

We approve of a tariff that will give American labor a just return, and furnish a revenue that will maintain our government, and also provide a sinking fund for the redemption of our national indebtedness.

We approve of a law of reciprocity that will add to our commerce and furnish a market for our surplus products.

We insist that Arizona be given the rights of statehood, and we demand this as a right and not as a favor.

We demand a restriction of immigration under proper laws, and that more care should be observed in admitting people to our shores, and that none should be given the rights of citizenship until they are fitted to exercise the same in an intelligent manner.

We are opposed to the appropriation of any of the public funds for sectarian purposes, and we claim that every expenditure of public moneys should be for public purposes only.

We pledge ourselves to nominate only honest, intelligent and capable men for the various offices to be voted for, and when so nominated, if possible, to elect them.

WASHINGTON—Ex-Secretary of State Smith came to Washington today from Atlanta in connection with business before the supreme court. He declined to talk politics.
ATLANTA—The Democratic committee today rejected the Populist proposition for a fusion ticket made up of seven Democratic and six Populist electors, declaring it to be insulting to the Democrats in its wording.

SAN FRANCISCO—There is fear of a general strike of sailors in this port. One vessel has already gone away with a non union crew at reduced wages.
FRANKFORT, Ky.—A mob of 300 toll gate raiders tore away the gates on the Owento, Pea's Mill and Flat Creek roads during the night.
SACRAMENTO—This afternoon Thos. Lannon, lineman of the Electric Light company, while at work on top of one of the company's masts fell to the street with a piercing shriek. He died a few hours later. He touched a live wire.

DENVER—Chief of Police Russell today communicated to District Attorney Whitford the confession of Albert Hince Downing, the highwayman, that he murdered Joel C. Ashworth of this city. He committed numerous robberies besides having murdered a man in 1885 at San Jose, California, and committed other crimes there.
WASHINGTON—Archbishop Ireland today authorized the statement concerning the published dispatches under a Rome date stating that the pope was vexed with the archbishop for the position he has taken on the political situation: "There is no truth whatever in the statement. What the purposes are of those who made this and similar statements I do not know."

Election Proclamation
OFFICE OF THE MAYOR OF THE CITY OF TOMBSTONE, ARIZONA TERRITORY.
To Whom It May Concern, Greeting:
Whereas, Under an act of the Legislative Assembly of the Territory of Arizona, entitled "Elections," approved March 8th, A. D. 1887, and in compliance with Section 4, Article 8 of the City Charter, a general municipal election is to be held on the 3rd day of November for the purpose of electing city officers.

Now, therefore, I, Paul B. Wankers, Mayor of the City of Tombstone, in pursuance of the duty imposed upon me by a resolution duly passed and entered upon the minutes of the Common Council of said city, do hereby order a general municipal election to be held on the Tuesday after the first Monday in November, A.
