UNDER THE GROUND.

A City That Exists and Flourishes Below the Surface.

It is generally believed that light and fresh air are absolute necessities to human existence, and that if the normal supply of either be cut off men cannot long exist. Their rock-salt houses are said to be perfect sanctuaries, and the average longevity of the denizens of the 'City of the Salt Mines' is said to exceed that of the surface inhabitants of Galicia.

THE FIRST ORANGES.

Arizona Finishes the First Boxes for Shipment.

W. N. Ward yesterday brought in from his ranch northeast of Phenix several boxes of oranges, the first to be marketed from the groves of the valley this year. They are a variety of seedless orange, small in size, but very sweet and juicy. They ripened this year earlier than was expected, and will be six weeks ahead of the California orange product. Figs and strawberries are again in market and are moving with good sales.

Mr. Ward expects to get 100,000 oranges from his grove of twenty-six acres, which is the first bearing of his trees. His trees have grown up unprotected in winter except by the heat of the Camel's back mountain, which is thrown off during the night and temper: the chilly atmosphere within a radius of several miles.

The orange groves in that section are a source of great attraction to our winter visitors, and to one who has never seen an orange with the trees filled with ripe fruit, they present an interesting sight—Republican.
