Supposed to be Disbanded and Seeking Safety.

Word received in Tombstone of the whereabouts of the Black Jack band is to the effect that that terrorizing band has pretty much disbanded and have left the territory. An attractive scheme for robbing the unwary has lately been worked in Chicago as a mining investment. A western gold mining company wanted \$40,000 to develop its plant. To obtain this it issued stock for \$200,000 on which a dividend of 8 per cent was guaranteed for ten years. The guarantee was made through a Chicago bank, the stock being sold at par. The bank withheld 80 per cent of the amount received for the stock or in all \$160,000, remitting to its client, the mining company, the \$40,000 required to develop the mine.

A GOOD IDEA.

For the Purchase and Development of Mines.

An incorporation has been formed in Salt Lake with a capital of \$50,000, divided into 500 certificates of a par value of \$100 each, and it is the aim and intention of the company to secure a list of 500 members, each of whom will hold one certificate of stock, and no member will be allowed to own or hold more than one certificate. The fund accumulated by the sale of these 500 certificates will be used only in the purchase of mining properties, for the development of which each member of the association will be assessed \$2 a month. CASA GRANDE.

Arizona's Ruin of Prehistoric Build.

Of the above named ruin the secretary of the interior says: "The Casa Grande ruin, located near Florence, in the territory, is one of the most noteworthy relics of a prehistoric age and people, remaining within the limits of the United States. The land on which it is located is part of 480 acres reserved from settlement by executive order dated June 22, 1892. It was discovered already in a ruinous condition, by one Padre Kino, in 1692, and since that time has been a subject of record by explorers and historians. This structure, like others erected by the most advanced among the native races in the southwest, is of perishable material, being built of adobe—that is, of puddle clay, molded into walls dried in the sun. "The director of the bureau of American Ethnology, who at the instance of this department caused an examination of the ruin to be made, concludes his report in the matter by stating: "In view of the slow yet ever increasing rate of destruction of the ruin and of its great interest as a tangible record of the prehistoric inhabitants of this country, no hesitation is felt in recommending that the structure be protected and practically perpetuated by a suitable roof, so designed as to shield the walls from rain and sun and at the same time permit an unobstructed view of the ruin from any direction."

SUNNY ARIZONA. Soil and Climate suited to the Culture of Dates.

The profitable cultivation of the date in Arizona has passed the experimental stage, and those who have been testing the same during the last ten years, give evidence that the date palm can be cultivated in any class of soil, peculiar to southern Arizona and that the amount of water necessary for the same after the first year is insignificant, as the plant will grow and flourish where the cacti thrive, as it belongs to the cacti family. The Star thinks that now there is a chance for the occupation of the vast areas of fertile mesa lands which are covered with luxuriant grasses and cacti. Why should not the same be utilized? Why should these vast areas of land which are so highly adapted to the production of this favored fruit, and which today is brought by the thousands of tons from the orient for consumption at home. The fruit which has been produced in Arizona has been declared by competent experts, to be as fine and as desirable as the very choicest imported dates. Let this subject be agitated until our people will enter upon the pleasant and profitable industry for which Arizona is by climate and other conditions so highly adapted.
