Mr May and wife and Walter Pearce and wife of Bowie went up to Cave Creek several days ago. No doubt they are bagging plenty of big game, such as bears, lions, etc, of which they told us they would bring back a wagon load.
Sam Glass, our forman here on the helper engine and Mr G P Colvin, expect to start on a hunt about the 15th of next month to be gone until they get tired. They have secured a pair of hounds and nothing less than bears will satisfy them with an occasional fight with some Indians.

While the grade of ore here does not run so very high as a rule it is easily worked and in good sized veins.

Minutes of the Board of Supervisors Cochise County
Tombstone, Aug. 26th, 1901.
10 a.m. This being the hour set for meeting of the Board of Supervisors and Thomas R York, Chairman of the Board being the only member present, P J Delahanty and George B Reay, members of the Board being unavailably absent, meeting was postponed to 3 p.m.
3 p.m. Board met pursuant to law and postponed, to fix the tax rate and make the levy for the year 1901.
Members present—Thos R York, Chairman and Supervisors P J Delahanty and Geo B Reay.
Minutes of meeting Aug. 2nd read and approved.
The Board having completed the additions of the columns of valuation of taxable property in Cochise county, Arizona, and having ascertained the amount to be \$7,498,407.43 liable to taxation therein.
Now therefore be it resolved, all members voting aye: that there be and is hereby levied and ordered to be collected on each \$100 valuation thereof for Territorial purposes and for the following named particular purposes, and in the following proportions, to-wit:—

The "Cannon Ball" arrived from the south three hours late, due to a washout on the south end.
Geo Overacker came in today and reports cattle looking well with good feed on the ranges.
Chas Hood collector of customs, stationed at Yuma went to Bisbee yesterday returning today. He left for Nogales this evening.
Supt B A Worthington and Resident Engineer C C Broule passed through Fairbank Monday on a tour of inspection of the road to Guaymas. The party returned to Tucson yesterday.
Monday Deputy Porter McDonald was serving summons on the settlers of the so called Boquillas Grant. The settlers have secured counsel and propose to contest it.
J E Guy and family left for Merced, Cal, yesterday. Mr Guy has held the important position of agent of this place for the past four years. He will be gone about a month. His place is filled by J R Clark of the Huachuca Station.
"Long John" Summers the road overseer was in town today collecting road taxes, and listening to tales of woe. He was given a wide berth by those that were "on to him."
Geo Burr formerly of Benson stepped over awhile on his way to Tucson. Mr Burr intends opening a saloon in Tombstone next to the telegraph office. He will celebrate his grand opening in about two weeks.

Hon Mark A Smith Arizona's delegate to Congress is a Tombstone visitor today and greeted by his many friends. Mr Smith is here on professional business.
A letter received from Dr Bacon states himself and wife will start homeward from Chicago about the 12th of next month.
A good rain fell here again last night and showers from other parts of the county is also reported.
A dependent Nevada miner, after telling friends that he intended to get off the earth, sat down on twenty-five pounds of giant powder and exploded it. He got off.
Governor Murphy's close friends declare that he does not have the slightest notion of resigning. That he will stick until his term of office expires. This sounds much more like the sentiments of Governor Murphy than does the rumor of his resignation.—Star.
The two cowboys who fired several shots while riding out of town yesterday were arrested and brought back to answer to the charge against them. A jury trial was asked for and the case will be tried before Judge Clark tomorrow at 10 a.m.
White winged Sonora pigeons are more plentiful now than at any time this summer. Next all these killed are young birds, and most delicious eating. The birds are "banding up" now, as is local sportsmen call it, an indication that they will not remain long.
The gross production of the United Verde at Jerome, Ariz, is now estimated at about \$49,000 a day, and it is stated that after all expenses have been deducted, there is a net income of \$12,000 daily.—Jerome Reporter.
A patient from Benson was received at the hospital today. He was shot in the fleshy part of the leg. Dr Bedford probed the wound and found the bullet had nearly penetrated through, it being extracted near the skin on the opposite side. The wound was dressed and no serious results are looked for.
A negro was admitted to the hospital yesterday from Naco suffering from a fracture of the bones of his right arm near the shoulder. The injury was the direct cause of encephalitis too close on the right of way of the railroad, an engine striking him on the arm. Owing to the peculiar nature of the fracture the patient may lose his arm, however, Dr Bedford is making an effort to save the same and after surgical examination a special and ingenious contrivance to act as aid with compress and bandage was made. The results can only be determined by developments and attention and is awaited with interest.

Col Ben Morgan will leave next Monday for California on a visit of several weeks duration.
John McCarty and family have returned to Tombstone after a visit of three months at Santa Monica.
Johnny Twomey is a Tombstone visitor from Bisbee. Johnny is well and favorably known, has many friends here and finds Tombstone a most attractive place to visit.
Prof J A Gaines of San Francisco, principal of the Tombstone public school for the ensuing term, arrived yesterday from the west. Prof Gaines comes highly recommended and will take charge of the school on Sept 9th when the session opens.
The jury in the case of the two cowboys on charge of shooting in the city limits, returned a verdict, finding one of the cowboys guilty and the other not guilty. A new trial is to be had tomorrow but the case against the one defendant was dismissed.
O B Steen and family arrived today on a brief visit. Mr Steen is operating the Copper Glance group of mines in the Huachuca formerly worked by the late S M Donnelly an associate. The property is under bond and the first payment was recently made by Mr Steen while developments warrant the hope that a big producer will be opened here.
One of the largest cattle deals that have been put through in the territory in many years, has just been consummated by Hon R G Brady of this city. Mr Brady passed through Tucson on No. 10 on Sunday morning, in company with two other large cattle buyers, all on their way to Denver. He has contracted for 12,000 head of cattle for next year, with cattle men of California.—Star.
A three year old Mexican child was killed in Phoenix by falling from the roof of a shed. It fell upon its head and its skull was crushed. The matter was never reported to the authorities. American women living in the neighborhood heard the cries of the mother all afternoon and went to her assistance. Still it was three days before the news of the child's death was made public.
The Hopi snake dance was celebrated yesterday, if the Indians are true to their advance notices. In the course of the week some of the tourists who journeyed so far to witness the performance will doubtless arrive to tell of it. It is said there were many more people attracted to the Hopi villages this year than usual and among them are many from Phoenix. Incidentally it may be mentioned that northern Arizona towns are beginning to appreciate the value of the snake dance as a tourist attraction. Flagstaff, Williams, Holbrook and Winslow each claims to be the nearest and have the best road to the Hopi villages.
R H Reynolds of Cochise county began suit in district court yesterday against Sam F Webb on a contract. At the same time the same plaintiff in the same matter began garnishing proceedings against the Valley bank and Logan Morris. This action is a result of the recent sale of the Relief mine by Geo Hamlin for \$10,000. The plaintiff and the defendant were the owners of the mine for some time previous to 1891, when the defendant, acting for himself and as agent for the plaintiff, sold it to Hamlin. The price is the subject of dispute. The plaintiff says it was \$4,000 and claims that the defendant represented that it was \$1,000. He accordingly brings suite to recover \$1,500, half of the difference.—Republican.

Particular attention is devoted to training in the pursuits of Arizona's two greatest industries and a practical course in the applied principles of each lead an intelligent aid to the development of our resources. The University is an Arizona institution of which all feel proud and willing to lend an encouraging hand to its continued success.
