VALUATION FOR TAX PURPOSES

State's Private Wealth Is Now Estimated at \$140,338,191.08 as Against \$98,000,000 One Year Ago; Figures by Counties

The property valuation as fixed by the state board of equalization for purposes of taxation this year, is \$140,338,191.08, as against about \$98,000,000 last year. The valuations of each class of property have not yet been totaled individually after segregation but will be in a few days. Following are the figures showing the total valuation in each county:

SO MANY CAN HEAR HEART BEATS

The Electro-Stethoscope Transmits the Sound to an Entire Clinic.

K. M. Turner, inventor of the diaphragm, which is playing such an important part in the conviction of crooked public officials, has invented a new contrivance for transmitting the heart-beat sound. It is to be known as the electro-stethoscope, and it will convey to an entire clinic at one time the heart action of a patient during an operation. The stethoscope now used conveys only to one person the sound of the heart beat. The new device will convey electrically to different parts of the operating room the audible action within the body of the patient over a series of wires, to receivers in the form of ear tubes, similar to those with which the ordinary stethoscope is equipped. A cup-shaped sound-collecting device is compressed to the part of the chest inclosing the heart or lungs and the sound from this region is transformed normally or magnified, at the will of the physician controlling it, to a class of any number of physicians. Mr. Turner has been working on the invention six years, and he has just given it the first demonstration. It works successfully.—Columbus Dispatch.

PHOENIX WANTS DRY CONGRESS

Movement to Secure the 1913 Convention of Waterless Farmers Was Begun in a Conference of State Delegates Yesterday

Phoenix will stage the 1913 congress of dry farmers if the movement started at the meeting yesterday has any effect. Called together by Governor Hunt, a number of gentlemen from about the state met at the board of trade yesterday afternoon to devise ways and means of luring the arid agriculturists to Arizona when next that body convenes. The purpose in making the fight for the congress is to bring Arizona's opportunities for the dry farmer to the notice of the men who indulge in that sort of soil tilling. And besides, there is the resultant good of the visit of over 5000 delegates, their ideas, possible investments and the advertising they will give the new state by their presence. With the experts on the ground, Arizona will be given the chance to demonstrate the great latent lands, waste now, but only desert because there is no way to get men to settle them. In forty other ways, more or less necessary, the Salt River valley will benefit by the invasion of a congress of the nation wide standing the "dry farmers" enjoy. Actually a great number of visitors will come and leave here. Also they will go and save words. And that is what is designed to be the best plum of all, the advertising of Arizona in parts where men eagerly catch at news of a land of outdoor promise, fruits of the farm and a chance to live on ground that makes the real living of the race.

The meeting was held under the chairmanship of Governor Hunt. Present were men of affairs, well to do, farmers and publicity men of all the state. Malcolm Fraser, secretary of the Prescott chamber of commerce, was one of the most active members at the meeting. Phoenix' representatives, B. E. Marks and Al Moore; those of Maricopa county, Vernon Clark and Harry Welch; and others made up an enthusiastic set of business getters. The afternoon's discussion was crystallized in the motion of W. H. Clark of Holbrook to make a bid for the meeting of the International Dry Farming congress for Phoenix in 1913. When it was decided the effort would be put forth to bring the convention here, the meeting proceeded to dig out methods in this connection, the matter of an exhibit from Maricopa county and Arizona at large to this year's congress was brought up. The state will be represented by a car of material, to be gathered and sent to Alberta, Canada under the steering hand of Secretary Fraser. It was found necessary to lift the sum of \$1700 to cover expenses of the exhibit. It was pledged in a few minutes, and Mr. Fraser was unanimously chosen as superintendent.

Fifty citizens, some named from among those present and others to be picked by the governor and the board of trade will form a committee to be picked by the governor and the board of trade will form a committee on ways and means. It will be their care to raise the sum of \$15,000, needed to insure the proper financing of the convention in Phoenix. Contributions will be secured in various ways, depending on the locality and men to whom application is to be made. The counties of Yavapai, Maricopa, Navajo, Apache, Yuma, Greenlee, Pima, Mohave, Cochise and Coconino will all make heavy contributions to the fund. This was the assurance of representatives of most of the subdivisions and those who knew the state of mind and pocketbook in the counties without delegates.

The fund for this year will be in charge of R. N. Fredericks of Prescott. The governor named those in attendance and others to receive notification later as members of the executive or committee. Plans with a representative of state wide choice, the committee is expected to get action in all parts where such is kept. Men interested in dry farming opportunities are sure to fall in line with the pioneers. In the time allotted them, there will be a great volume of business accomplished. By the time the Alberta congress is ready to open Professor McOmie of Tucson will have gathered a goodly show of dry tilled products for this coming exposition.

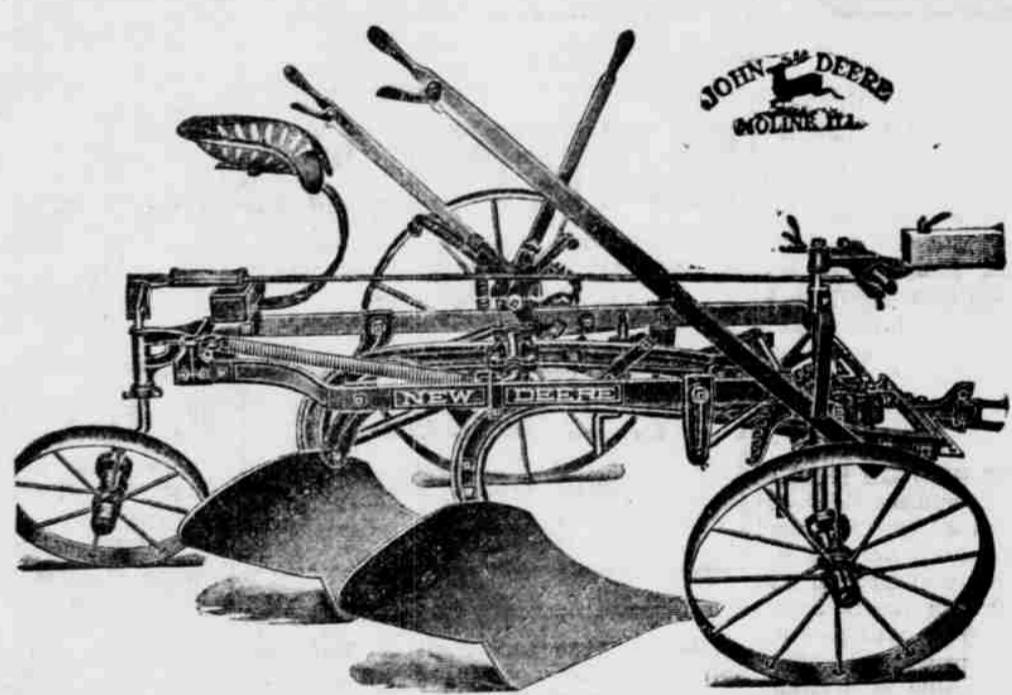

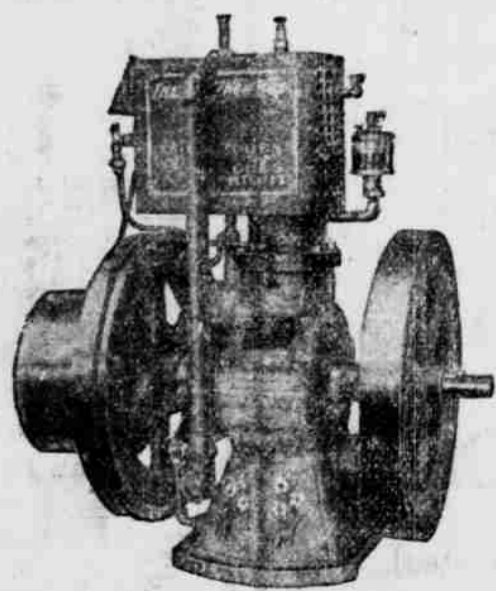
