**MORE LAND OPENED  
UP FOR IRRIGATION**

Since the opening of the Roosevelt  
dam there has been no more made in  
the Salt River valley of as much  
importance as the new irrigation now  
being authorized by J. W. Walker and  
H. L. Chandler and others. These  
gentlemen are preparing a scheme to  
irrigate about twelve thousand acres  
of land southeast of Chandler.

This land is some of the finest in  
the valley and is especially adapted  
to the production of cotton, melons  
and fruits, as it is a sandy loam of  
great depth and fertility. It lies just  
out of the irrigable section of the  
valley and cannot be reached by  
canal from the Roosevelt dam or  
from any other source except at great  
expense. It is proposed by the new  
project to install pumping plants of  
large capacity, making each plant a  
unit and the land watered by it to be  
a unit, and in no way connected with  
the other plants unless by special  
agreement. The land holders of each  
unit will own and control the plant  
for that unit. When finished and  
turned over to the land holders, each  
unit will be fully paid for and will  
belong to the land holders under in-  
debt-free title carrying a share of  
water. For their part the promoters  
will take half of the land watered.  
This land will be put in cultivation  
and sold to parties on good terms,  
so that a man with very little means  
and a good will to work can be able  
to secure a home that will eventually  
make him independent.

The power for running these pumps  
will be secured from the Roosevelt  
dam or from a central power plant.  
What this will mean to Mesa and  
the surrounding towns of Chandler,  
Gilbert and Higley can only be con-  
jectured. The project now under  
thousand acres of highly cultivated  
land is practically beyond compare  
and it will all pass through the  
channels of trade to one or the other  
of these cities, and this is not all—  
if it is found that this scheme is  
practical, which it will be, there are  
thousands of other acres in the valley  
that will sooner or later be placed  
under the pumping system. There  
are unlimited possibilities of power  
under the Roosevelt dam system, and  
with this power used to further im-  
prove the valley, Maricopa county  
would soon be the richest common-  
wealth in the southwest. Contracts  
are being signed as rapidly as pos-  
sible by the land owners and it is  
said that work on the project will  
commence within three days.

Work on the Mesa gir is progressing  
nicely under the supervision of  
Manager Guy Atkaway. The frame-  
work of the building is already in  
place and the placing of the ma-  
chinery will commence as soon as  
the building is finished. The gir will

earliest cotton, if there is no hitch in  
the arrival of the machinery.

**ESCAPES FROM STOCKADE  
ARE APPREHENDED**

Two Departures From Government  
Works at Tempe on Monday are no  
go. Convicts Returned to  
State Pen.

Tex Thompson and Roy Barrett, the  
two inmates of the local stockade who  
made a getaway Monday afternoon, are  
once more behind the bars of the state  
pen at Phoenix following their cap-  
ture this side of Fort McDowell. Just  
twenty-four hours after disappearing  
so suddenly from the local works, a  
thorough search was made in every di-  
rection from Tempe just as soon as  
their escape was learned, and they  
soon led to the belief that they were  
heading in the direction of McDowell.

Several details of guards from the  
Tempe stockade took up the trail of  
the escapes following them up the Salt  
River to the junction of the Verde, C.  
W. Turner, one of the guards, made  
direct for Fort McDowell. Here he en-  
listed the services of three Indian  
trappers and some saddle horses. Leave-  
ing the government station, Turner and  
one Indian took one road while the  
other trappers branched off to a second  
highway.

About three miles this side of Mc-  
Dowell Turner and the Indian spied

their men trodding wearily along to-  
wards them. Upon sight of their cap-  
tors the convicts made an attempt at  
escape for a second time and one of  
them was the proprietor of a modified  
marathon race. But it all turned out  
O. K. With the two men in charge,  
Turner and the Indian returned to the  
Fort and shortly after left for the  
stockade via an automobile.

Both of the convicts were addressed  
in civilian clothes at the time of their  
apprehension. While it was thought  
by the guards that the escapes had en-  
dled outside aid, the latter firmly deny  
the suspicion. They claim that their  
clothes were picked up from an old  
trash pile which they ran across short-  
ly after leaving the stockade.

Captain of the Guard Joe Bush, in  
charge of the two escapes, left yester-  
day morning for the state penitentiary  
at Phoenix to place the men once more  
in absolute safe-keeping, this time to  
remain there until the end of their  
sentence, one for five years and the  
other from five to fifteen years.

Thompson and Barrett made their  
escape Monday afternoon from Tempe  
taking to the bushes when they were  
assigned to a wood chipping detail  
which was at work on the banks of  
the river some distance from the  
stockade. Nothing more was seen of  
them after their departure from the  
stockade until their apprehension Tues-  
day afternoon, just about twenty-four  
hours later. They had covered the en-  
tire distance to the Verde on foot,  
making a greater part of it Monday  
night.

**CHARLES BAUER DEAD.**

made at a local burial grounds.


**WILL ATTEND THROOP.**
