

MODERN POLITICS.

From now until the result of the presidential election is determined, secular newspapers will be burthened with political prognostications, and wilful falsehoods, varying in color from black through every shade to the mild and comparatively harmless white lie, thrown out as baits to catch the unwary and unthinking voter.

A rehearsal of recent newspaper deductions, as to the result of the Republican nominating convention, will prove interesting, and show that even the divinations of editors, who make politics a study, are wide of the mark, and are no more to be relied on than soothsayers who pretend to foretell the future.

Gen. O. E. Babcock and Levi P. Lucky, his clerk, formerly assistant private secretary of President Grant, whose deaths by drowning off the coast of Florida we announced in our last, were not men of savory reputations, in consequence of their having been implicated in the whisky frauds of 1875.

One of the members of the whisky ring, in giving a statement concerning the trial, said: "This trial was one of the most remarkable and, in most respects, the most noteworthy ever held in America. Not that there were any intricate problems of jurisprudence involved, but because it arrayed the people directly against the executive. It was essentially a fight between justice and the cormorants of power and mighty influence, and alas, that it must be said, justice was defeated. Secretary Bristow, although earnest and determined in the prosecution of Babcock, felt a delicacy in placing the president of the United States in a position where he would appear in the eyes of the nation as a co-defendant in the case."

We learn from Dr. Hendrix who recently returned from the King mine that a magazine at Pinal belonging to Mr. Martin, containing 1400 pounds of black and giant powder, exploded on the 2nd instant. The report was heard at a great distance and the concussion was sensibly felt at Silver King, five miles distant, being so severe as to cause the houses there to shake. He further reports that, on May 31st, three men in the King mine while descending from one level to another were precipitated some fifteen feet by the breaking of the cable by which they were being lowered. Two of the men escaped with slight injuries; the third however had a rib broken. The doctor also mentions having seen a 16 mule team hauling thirty-seven and a half tons of ore from the King dump to the reduction works at Pinal.

There was great consternation at Santa Fe, on the 6th inst., on account of a report brought in by a very reliable gentleman to the effect that an immense body of back water from the Rio Grande was coming up the Santa Fe river at the velocity of a railway train, and was liable to inundate the town at a moment's notice. When our informant left, Surveyor-General Atkinson was packing up the papers in his office preparatory to moving out on to the roof, and Walter Hayt was moving his household goods into the second story of his residence.—Albuquerque Journal.

Atchison, Topeka & Santa Fe Extension.

There is no longer any doubt that it is the purpose of the railroad company to lay a third rail between here and Deming, and extend this section of the line through to Benson, using the broad gauge. This will throw the through travel to the Pacific by way of Deming, Silver City and Benson. The reason for the move is apparent. The sole break in the Atchison, Topeka line from Kansas City to Guaymas is between Deming and Benson. Here, by agreement which has still more than two years to run, they are restrained from building parallel with the Southern Pacific. There is nothing, however, to prevent them from extending the Silver City branch through to Benson and thus closing the gap. In fact their purchase of this road can be explained only upon the theory of such purpose. It is folly to imagine that they made the investment merely for the satisfaction of owning a plug road forty-seven miles in length. Furthermore the road from Silver City to Benson would open up extensive mining districts, and soon become a most valuable feeder to the main line.

The Grand Army of the Republic has been very busy for months past sending petitions to Congress in support of pension, bounty, and back-pay legislation. We have already provided pensions and back pay for everybody who was hurt in any way while in the army. There remain now only two things to do. One is to pension everybody who ever served in the army, and who has grown older and less active since he left it; the other is to pension everybody who would have liked to serve in the army, but was prevented by physical disability, or the pressure of private business, or who sent a substitute who was killed or has since died. After the public has been familiarized for a while with all this, doubtless a proposal to pension every American citizen, not a criminal, will be received with a certain amount of favor.

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A House concurrent resolution, providing for the adjournment of Congress June 30th, has been adopted by a vote of the House.

Gov. Tritle has offered \$500 reward for the apprehension of the robbers who held up the stage near Black Canon a few nights since.

The Rev. Father Gallagher, of Tombstone, who assaulted Recorder Reilly, beside receiving a severe pounding, was fined \$50 and cost of trial.

Some of the members of the late special grand jury of Pima, who recently indicted county officials, are having it handed back to them, by arraignment for violation of law.

A law of Arizona requires that where oleomargarine is sold that the fact must be made known by three posted notices. The failure to give such notice subjects the offender to a fine and imprisonment.

Mr. Marshall, the original discoverer of gold in California, has presented the Society of California Pioneers with a copy of General Sutter's will at Georgetown, St. Dorado county. They consist of the old mill's flutter-wheel, crank-shaft, set of dogs, an iron pipe, a hammer, a gudgeon-band, etc.

The Apache Chief says, "Apache country stands alone in the fight" against the Mormons, which is doubtless a fact. It will be left severely alone by other counties of the territory in its endeavor to "wipe the Mormons out." The chivalrous Quixote was not interfered with when he attacked the windmill.

Here is the principle adopted by the Lawrence, Kansas, capitalists, who own the "Organ smelter, near Las Cruces: "The smelter will not run on Sundays. The fires will be banked up and the furnace kept warm, but no metal will be tapped."

The owners, to be consistent, should only eat cold grub and deny themselves the indulgence of kissing their wives on Sunday.

The 10th census (1880) of the United States, places the total population of Arizona at 22,271, of which number only 471 are classed as females, but that was four years ago. The population since then has more than doubled, if not trebled. And while there is still a very great number more males than females in the Territory, it is a consolation to know that "God's last best gift to man," has more than proportionately increased in number, and generally of a class well calculated to benefit and bless mankind.

One of Butler's friends explains his plan of Presidential campaign, and the scheme is Butlerish enough to be genuine. He says Butler wants the Anti-Monopoly and Greenback nominations simply to give him strength as a candidate before the National Democratic Convention; that he will go into the Convention with a large following who will cling to him as long as there is any hope; when his own nomination is seen to be impossible he will use his forces to name the candidate, and thus establish a basis for a claim; that he will then publish a card withdrawing as the candidate of the Anti-Monopoly and Greenback parties, advising them to vote for the Democratic candidates, and will have himself nominated again as the Democratic candidate for Governor of Massachusetts.

Roger A. Prior says Samuel J. Tilden will accept the democratic nomination. Ex-speaker Randall is reported as saying he has positive knowledge of the fact that Mr. Tilden will accept the nomination if tendered. This statement was made without qualification to several members of congress. Senator Vest, who recently saw and talked with Mr. Tilden, believes that he will accept. Ex-senator Gordon of Georgia, who is reported as having received a letter from Mr. Tilden positively refusing to accept the democratic nomination, says he never seen such a letter. Carl Schurz says it will not do for the Republican party to disguise the fact that Tilden will prove a strong man before the people. Another has expressed the belief that "Tilden is the opposition's strongest man." George William Curtis coincides in the opinion of Schurz and Arthur. So too does Ben Harrison and Dick Thompson of Indiana.

It is about certain that M. W. Bremen, now in New York, has disposed of his mining interests here, for the handsome sum of \$500,000, and that the company making the purchase has organized with a capital of \$1,000,000, and will apply the half million above purchase money to the development of their property, the erection of works, and, it is believed, to the purchase of other property here. There is, of course, a measure of conjecture about this, but from the data in hand, the more knowing do not hesitate to express the opinion that the situation is precisely as we have stated it and a feature of the transaction which is eminently worthy of our attention, is this: M. W. Bremen with half a million of money means something for Silver City; for Mr. Bremen is not a man to rest on his oars. We may safely anticipate that he will at once commence work on the mines he still owns, and probably erect reduction works in connection therewith.—Southwest Sentinel.
