TELEGRAPHIC SPARKS

Fresh From the Wires from All Points.

Washington, October 3.—The coming of Admiral George Dewey—henceforth the national capital is to be his home—was made the occasion for the greatest tribute ever paid by Washington to any individual. After the preliminary welcome in New York, he surpassed in its kind, it remained for the highest and greatest in the official world to hold out the hand of greeting to the famous admiral and to join with the people who are to be his fellow-citizens in bidding him welcome. The citizens had made every preparation to make the occasion worthy of their hero. The decorations were elaborate. His journey from New York had been one continuous ovation limited in its intensity only by the density of its population.

Columbus, Ohio, October 3.—Senator Hanna denies with characteristic emphasis the report that he will resign the chairmanship of the National Republican committee. He says: "I cannot imagine what has given rise to such a report unless it is my physical condition, rumors of which have been greatly exaggerated."

Phoenix, Oct. 3.—Articles of incorporation of the Morenci & Southern railroad were filed here yesterday by Phelps, Dodge & Co., of New York. The road will connect with the A. & N. M. & G. Guthrie. The road will be an outlet for Morenci.

Dallas, Texas, Oct. 3.—The carnival opened today, the event of the morning being the arrival of W. J. Bryan. The city is packed with democrats representing forty states, Oklahoma and Indian Territory.

London, October 3.—Reports from Cape Town declare an immediate rupture of diplomatic relations between Great Britain and the Transvaal, expected South Africa.
