ENGLAND'S NIGHTMARE

Fear Elements of Peril and Menace.

SALISBURY HAS THE JIM-JAMS

Britain's Premier Sees Phantom Invasions--Fears the Crown's Weakness.

LONDON, May 10.—Referring to England's foreign relations, Salisbury, in his speech yesterday, said: "The menace and peril were slowly accumulating and might reach a point requiring the government's earnest efforts to repel them."

NEW SOURCE OF X-RAYS. A Discovery Believed to Be of the Greatest Importance.

CAMBRIDGE, Mass., May 10.—Prof. Trowbridge of the Jefferson Physical Laboratory, has perfected a new method of obtaining x-rays. Heretofore the currents of electricity used in making photographs have been fluctuating, making pictures of uncertain value to surgeons.

EDITOR AND ALDERMAN SHOT. Street Fight in Jacksonville Over a Franchise Contest.

JACKSONVILLE, Fla., May 10.—The fight between the Plant system and the Atlantic, Valdosta and Western railway to obtain new franchises for street railways here resulted today in a shooting affray in the street, between C. W. Stanzell, alderman from the Seventh ward, and A. W. Williamson, publisher of the Florida Journal.

COLORADO REPUBLICANS. Wolcott Elected Chairman--McKinley Eulogized.

DENVER, Colo., May 10.—The Republican State convention was held here today at the Broadway theatre with a large enthusiastic and brilliant gathering. Senator Wolcott, who was elected temporary chairman, received an ovation.

After the appointment of committees the convention adjourned until this afternoon. Senator Wolcott will doubtless see the Colorado delegation to Philadelphia.

WANTS TO WED AT 74. Wealthy Miss Pierce's Relatives Try to Prevent her Marriage to a Young Man.

BOSTON, May 10.—Miss Louise Pierce of Newton, who is 74 years old and wealthy, and Charles Hall Barnes, 32 years old, a resident of Boston, applied for a marriage license today. Assistant Registrar Rideout did not grant the license, although he did not actually refuse to issue one.

ST. LOUIS CONVENTION. Springfield Rifles and Bullets a Diet for the Strikers.

ST. LOUIS, May 10.—The running of the suburban cars was resumed at 6 o'clock this morning with from four to six policemen on each car. At 9 o'clock General Manager Jenkins announced thirty five-cars running on schedule time on the main line.

CROSS THE ZAND. Roberts Wins a Fight--Boers in Full Retreat.

LONDON, May 10.—Roberts reports at noon his success in crossing the Zand. He engaged the Boers who retreated before him. There is sharp fighting going on today north of the Zand, with the artillery playing a leading role in the battle.

MILITARISM. Neely Will not Confront Our Civil Courts.

WASHINGTON, May 10.—The president and secretary Root, Attorney-General Briggs and Postmaster General Smith held a conference this afternoon over the Neely case. It was decided that Neely be tried in Havana and Governor Roosevelt be asked to deliver up the prisoner to the military authorities, who will transport him to Cuba for trial.

THE SECOND DAY'S SESSION

Patterson of Colorado Dilates Upon the Principles of Populism.

SIOUX FALLS, May 10.—Clear weather with a steady prairie breeze that swayed the canvass walls of the peoples party meeting place, again favored the delegates to the National Convention at the opening of the second day's session.

The vice presidential situation remains practically the sole subject of discussion. Two men won a victory at the meeting of the committee on credentials, through the adoption of a report refusing representation to states not actually represented on the floor.
