## **PUSHING ON TO NATAL**

### **Buller Continues His March to the Front.**

#### **WILL REACH DUNDEE TODAY**

### **The Burghers Are Supposed to Yet Create Trouble for the Aggressors.**

LADYSMITH, May 14.—Buller has an army of 40,000 men pushing north into Natal, evidently making for the Laings Nek Pass into the Transvaal. Buller has fought a successful engagement on the Biggarsburg road in order to flank the Boers' positions. The flanking movement was successful and the Boers are said to be retreating. Buller is expected to reach Dundee today.

Some dispatches say there will be very little resistance at the Vaal. But this optimism is accounted for by Roberts' sweeping advance. The absence of advices from sources concerning the Vaal defenses seems ominous. It is reported the Freestaters are demoralized, and the report seems well founded. There is report that the British advance will make no further resistance. According to reliable reports the burghers' forces near Thaba N'Chuzens will be held together and may yet prove troublesome. President Steyn is said to have kicked and "jambottled" several Free-staters in his rage over their refusal to fight longer. Steyn probably has gone to Pretoria to confer with Kruger.

The proclamation of Roberts formally connecting the Orange Free State colony will be issued forthwith.

#### **A VAST HOSPITAL.**

### **Deaths from Exposure are Beginning to tell on the Soldiers.**

LONDON, May 14.—Bloemfontein, which was formerly the healthiest town in South Africa, is now a vast hospital. It is reported that there are 2,500 cases of enteric fever alone. The nights are bitter cold and deaths from exposure are beginning to be reported. None of the correspondents agree as to the number of Transvaalers who retired from Kroonstadt; the highest estimate is 10,000. From all accounts the retreat was made in good order. They saved all their guns and a quantity of stores. Just what preparations for defense the Boers are making on the north bank of the Vaal is not known.

#### **Got What He Was Looking for.**

AUGUSTA, Ga., May 14.—William B. Willis (colored), who shot and killed Aleck Whitney, a prominent white man, yesterday evening, for not making room for him in a street car, was lynched by a mob at Grovania at 3 o'clock this morning.

#### **Insurgents Again Give Battle.**

MANILA, May 14.—Col. Arthur Murray, with the Forty-third Infantry, occupied Hilergos and Massin, two large towns in the island of Layte. The insurgents offered considerable opposition, but finally were driven out with heavy losses. The Americans lost three wounded.

#### **A Speedy Event.**

Judge Chisholm's celebrated Kansas trotter "Also Ran" broke loose from his moorings yesterday noon and indulged in an exhibition spin that for a few moments bade fair to alter the topography of Hopewell avenue and reduce the judge's imported English trap to kindling wood. "Also Ran" had been thoughtlessly hitched in contaminating contiguity to a plebian company, and, being a horse with a proper regard for his own noble lineage, took umbrage at such debasing association and endeavored to remove himself and appurtenances without prostration. The damages were slight.

#### **An Indian Outrage.**

Mr. Grenfell indignantly avers that Chief Lay-Dog, Young-Man-Afrid-of-Sooap, or some other member of the Arapahoe tribe of Red Men, wiped all the feathers from his prize turkey's tail piece to decorate themselves for Saturday's parade. He says he considered himself lucky inasmuch as they did not swipe the turkey itself to augment the Big Feed.

#### **A MINE ACCIDENT.**

### **Four Miners Injured by a Blast at the Spray Shaft.**

At the Spray shaft about 10 o'clock Saturday night four miners were injured by a blast. One of them, John Kronman, may die; the others escaped with slight injuries.

The men had just blasted, but in counting the reports they made an error of one shot, and descended just in time to receive the full force of a delayed charge as it exploded. John Kronman was struck by a mass of the flying debris and injured, it is supposed internally. Lee Borgstrom was cut about the face and had two of his front teeth knocked out. John Williams and Joe Ballinger were more fortunate, escaping with but slight cuts.

The blame, if any blame there be, would ordinarily rest with the men; but as it is impossible always accurately to tell just how many explosions occur during the blasting of a round of holes, it must be placed among those innumerable accidents which are unlooked for, and therefore unavoidable.

#### **MINING NOTES.**

An article recently published in the mining column of the REVIEW, concerning the Montezuma Gold Mining company, operating in the Hauchuca mountains, was erroneous in some respects. Therefore the REVIEW here-with submits an accurate account of the company's operations: The Montezuma Gold Mining company, operating in Hartford district, is making some wonderful revelations in the mining industry of that section of Cochise county. Henry Hamburg, the general manager, displayed marked ability in the exploitation of the seven claims that constitute the group, showing that he is no novice in the business. All of the claims have received some attention, but the principal development has been confined to the Esperanza, from which some excellent gold rock has been taken, although but little depth has thus far been attained. From the Monte Carlo Mr. Hamburg recently shipped seventeen tons of ore, worth \$45.80 per ton, making an aggregate of \$770.45 for the shipment. This was choice ore, of course, but one can readily conceive the richness of the deposit when such net returns can be had under such expensive operations as freight by wagon, and thence by rail to eastern reduction works. Mr. Hamburg is also owner of three patented copper claims in Ramsey canyon, in the same vicinity, which are said to be very promising. Prof. Blake, of the University of Arizona, has made favorable report on the copper group, and assays of ore from the same gave returns of 45 per cent copper and 36 ounces silver. These properties have development to a considerable extent, and large bodies of high grade ore have been uncovered, giving assurance that it is not merely a prospect but the making of a good mine. With capital to operate this group of copper properties, there is no doubt but what the Huachuca would boast one of the best producers in southern Arizona.

#### **Jefferies Out With a Defi.**

NEW YORK, May 14.—Jefferies says that if Corbett is anxious for a return battle he will fight him within a week, while they are yet in condition. Jefferies says he is willing to bet \$10,000 to \$5,000 on himself.

"Now," said the champion, "it is the general thing for a champion to be challenged, so I challenge anybody who wants a battle. I am willing to take on Sharkey, Fitzsimmons, Ruhlman McCoy or Maher, any one or all five of the five of them."

We can't set a high price on Colonel Bryan's talk about putting a price on human life. He and the rest of the anti-imperialist faction have virtually been putting a price on the Americans in the Philippines by encouraging the Tagalog insurgents. If Col. ## **AMERICA AT THE EXPOSITION**

### **Building Improved by Beautiful Statuary**

#### **M'KINLEY PORTRAIT IN POSITION**

### **Commissioner Peck Made a Good Talk and Was Gracefully Received.**

PARIS, May 14.—The formal opening of the American National Pavilion at the exposition took place today. From the appearance of the building, which is not much of an artistic triumph, has been improved by the erection of some fine statuary, while the interior has been beautified with frescoes, draperies, etc. The central position in the main hall is occupied by the big portrait of McKinley.

The ceremony of opening began at 2:30 p. m. when Mr. M. Pickard, commander general of the exposition, entered the building on the arm of Popf. Woodward, assistant commissioner of general of the United States. Sousa's band was stationed near the entrance and as M. Pickard entered played "The Marseillaise." Commissioner General Peck met the French commissioner at the door and escorted him to the rotunda. In turning the buildings over to the exposition Mr. Peck said:

"The great nation which I have the honor to represent rejoices to have been permitted to erect this structure in the street of the nations. It is my duty and pleasure to transfer to you this edifice which is a gift of the nation, gladly united with other nations, in bringing here its products as a contribution to a great peace festival so happily inaugurated.

"I know my countrymen will join me in the sentiment of vive Commissioner General Pickard; vive L'Exposition, vive L'France. Then Mr. Peck presented Mr. Pickard with a gold key pendant as a souvenir of the occasion.

Mr. Peckard responded to Mr. Peck's speech with a brief appreciative address and the ceremony concluded.

#### **The Red Men.**

The annual pow-wow of the Improved Order of Red Men of the reservation of Arizona, came off Saturday afternoon and evening and Bisbee was taken possession of by the sons of the forest.

The parade, as noted in the columns of the REVIEW Saturday afternoon, was a success in every detail, the turnout being the most complete ever attempted by any fraternal organization in Arizona. Something more than one hundred Red Men were in procession—several visitors from afar joining to swell the ranks of the order, their unique costumes adding to the gaiety of the scene and contributing to the enjoyment of the throng of spectators who had assembled to witness the event of the year in Bisbee.

After the afternoon's performance a carefully prepared programme was carried out at the opera house, when addresses, songs, dances and many entertaining specialties contributed to the enjoyment of the large assemblage who had been specially invited. It is said by those who were present to have been a success in every detail.

The original poem by B. Franklin Moore is regarded with much favor, as were also many of the other special numbers. A lack of space precludes the publication of the poem today, but it will appear in tomorrow's issue of the REVIEW.
