CONCLUSION JUMPED AT BY CANDIDATE BRYAN

Why He Thought the Steel Trust Was Aiding Taft

He Had Never Heard Any Prominent Republican Say Anything Against the Corporation and It Had Never Been Dragged Into the Courts.

New York, Sept. 18.—William J. Bryan arrived this afternoon and proceeded at once to the Hoffman House. At Jersey City he was besieged by newspaper men who wanted him to elaborate his charges made yesterday at Harrington, Delaware, and again last night at Wilmington, that officials of the United States Steel Corporation were supporting the republican party in the campaign.

In reply to the question, "Does your charge that the steel trust is protecting the steel trust extend to the chief executive?" he said: "I stated what everybody knows—that the steel trust has not been prosecuted and no prominent republican has said anything against it. I have said the steel trust is supporting the republican ticket and that the republican national committee will not dare to publish before the election the contributions which they will receive from the officials of the steel trust. Mr. Sheldon virtually admits this in an interview in the New York Herald. He is treasurer of the committee, and as I understand it, a director of a constituent corporation of the steel trust. He is quoted as saying: 'If a member of the executive committee of an officer of the United States Steel Corporation wishes to support the republican party, has he not the same right as any other individual?'"

Mr. Bryan said in the interview that he was satisfied that in the event of his election no legitimate interest would be jeopardized or suffered. He declared he had never endorsed Roosevelt, but had criticized him when he thought him wrong, and commended him when he thought
