MILITIA OFFICERS TO ESCORT VILLA

Adj. Gen. Harris and Capt. Stacy Will Meet Mexican Generals and Accompany them to Nogales

Col. Charles W. Harris, adjutant general of Arizona, and Capt. Cromwell Stacy, U. S. A., will act as escort to Generals Obregon and Villa when they pass through the state today en route to Sonora. The Mexican generals will be met at Tucson and accompanied to Nogales.

Appointment of Col. Harris to meet the constitutionalist leaders as his special representative was made yesterday by Gov. Hunt. Following the receipt of word last night that the special train bearing the Mexican leaders and their staffs would leave El Paso this morning, reaching Arizona about noon, the American officers took an early train for Tucson, where they will show Generals Obregon and Villa the customary military courtesies.

An enthusiastic reception was tendered the constitutionalists when they reached the Pas City yesterday afternoon, and they were escorted from the international bridge to Ft. Bliss by a troop of American cavalry as a guard of honor.

A telegram was received yesterday by Gov. Hunt from General Carranza, expressing his thanks for the courtesies shown Gen. Benjamin Gil in his passage through this state, while en route to Sonora to relieve Col. Elias P. Calles as military governor.

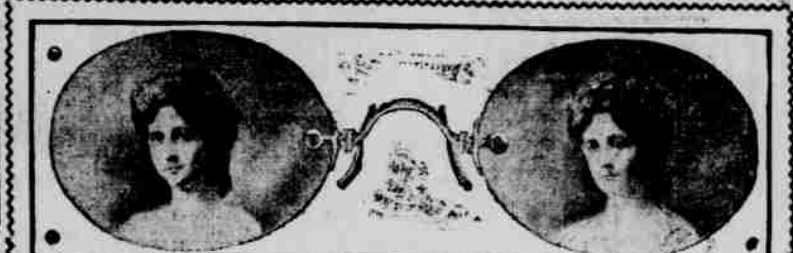
