More information about the observatory which may be built on Kitt's Peak; one of three places in Arizona being considered, was recently told.

About 11 years will be required to build the three telescopes, according to Dr. A. J. Meinel of the National Astronomical Observatory. One will be three feet in diameter, another will be seven feet in diameter, and the third will be the largest in the world, or about 33 feet in diameter.

Choice of which place will be the location of the observatory will be announced this summer or in the fall. In addition to the Kitt's Peak location, the other two are near Flagstaff and near Kingman.
