Reed, who left here about a year ago with his family, died in Las Cruces, N. M., on the 23d of September last. He was a highly respected citizen. MINING MATTERS.

The Grand Central company is working its properties all along the line for all they are worth, and the mill is running to its full capacity of thirty stamps. The Emerald, Grand Central, State of Maine and other properties of the company are looking about the same as at the last report.

NORTH POINT.

Connection was made this week between the air shaft and the lower workings, and now that the air is good, active developments are being made on the ledge. In running the dirts about ten tons of good ore per day are produced from this mine. It is looking very well.

Work of straightening the old shaft and timbering is completed, and to-morrow a force of men will be put on for thorough development of the property.

Horn silver ore was yesterday struck in this property, which of late has not been looking well. Now the outlook is much better.

BOSS.

Shaft down 365 feet, producing a small quantity of ore very rich in gold.

SILVER THREAD.

The lowest workings are 310 feet, and the shaft will be sunk to water as rapidly as possible. The usual quantity of ore is being extracted.

VIZINA.

We shall be obliged to the EPITAPH or any responsible correspondent for information as to the present underground condition and prospects of this property; also, who her or not the interested original stockholders of the company that worked the property and paid several dividends in 1882 have been legally dispossessed of that interest?—N. Y. Financial and Mining Record.

The underground condition of this property at the present time is excellent. A large body of high grade ore has been developed above the 200 level, and recently several carloads have been shipped to the smelter. By a vote of a majority of the stockholders, at a meeting held in New York on November 27th, 1883, the directors of the Vizina Mining company were authorized to sell the mine, and at a meeting of the directors at Bradford, Pa., on September 18th, 1885, they so sold the property to H. A. Tweed, of Tombstone, for the sum of \$11 600. By Mr. Tweed it was decided to Casper Taylor on the 23d of February, 1886, and the title is now in him.

OMEGA MINE, SONORA.

This property is situated about 18 miles from Bacochi and 65 miles from the Custom-house, and is considered one of the best properties in Sonora. It is developed by two tunnels, 1500 feet apart, one in 500 feet and the other 300, besides about 1000 feet in drifts, etc. The ore is somewhat refractory, yet there are 1000 tons on the dumps which will sample 80 ounces, besides a large quantity in sight in the mine. Superintendent J. M. Cumming is at present in the city figuring on concentrators. He with J. S. Byington, Danl. Whitmore and Chas. R. Colender, of California, own the property. They employ fourteen men.

CONCENTRATORS FOR HARSHAW.

Mr. Geo. W. Cheney, superintendent of the T. M. and M. company, has started into a business on his own account which the EPITAPH predicts will prove very successful. He has purchased a mill in Harshaw and will erect and have in operation within the next sixty days, complete concentrating works. He will start in with two True concentrators, a 20-horsepower engine, rock-breakers, etc., but will enlarge as increased business demands. The only wonder is that similar works were not started in that camp long ago, as there are many old dumps of ore too low grade to ship, which will well repay concentrating. Besides, the ore is admirably adapted for concentration.

SAN RAFAEL.

The drift from the 65 foot-station, in 21 feet, this week encountered ore that assays 176 ounces. A force of men will start in Monday to develop the property.

A PESSIMIST VIEW.

"RAISE! RAISE! RAISE THE PRICE!"

Observations of an Arizona Man on the Condition of Affairs in California—Not a Flattering Prospect by Any Means.

TOMBSTONE, Oct. 13, 1887.

EDITOR EPITAPH: I passed through California in the month of September last. The crops were good in the north and middle portion of the State. In the southern part the grain crops are short, but there is a fair crop of fruits of all kinds. Business is brisk in all branches, especially in real estate. From the northern counties to San Luis, lands are selling at a fair valuation—a price that the purchaser has reason to believe he can make a fair interest on his investment, live in one of the finest climates on the planet, and raise anything that is necessary for the human family to eat or wear. In the southern portion of the State it is very different; prices of land have been boomed up to such a figure that a man could make twice as much by investing his capital in United States bonds as he could in real estate in that part of the country.

From Santa Barbara county south they are digging up orchards and vineyards that are coming into bearing, and laying out towns, town extensions and additions, and suburban districts, to cities on paper.

I found it necessary to stop over at Indio on the desert on account of a break on the railroad, caused by the late rains, or lay over at Pomona in Los Angeles county. I preferred the latter place as there was 20 degrees difference in the temperature, and by way of killing time I went into a real estate office and enquired the price of land. The agent told me to get into a buggy at the door and he would show me the land and give the price at the same time. I replied that I did not wish to purchase, that I was laying over on account of a break in the railroad and simply asked for information.

"That makes no difference," was the reply; "if I do not sell you a tract of land, I will make the whole town think that I have."

So I got a fifteen mile ride for nothing. He showed me, and priced lands all the way from \$700 to \$1300 per acre. I naturally enquired what a man could raise on that land to make an interest on the investment?

"Raise! Raise! Man alive!" said he, "you are not up to the times—raise the price!"

I told him to drive back to town by the shortest cut; I wished to go east by the first train, as I would sooner chance 120 degrees of heat on the desert than to stay there and take my chances of being sent to Stockton with a Los Angeles county real estate agent. There is land enough laid out in town lots in Los Angeles and San Diego counties to supply every family in California with a home. In San Diego county they are selling climate, with a gravelly cactus plain for a foundation, at from \$300 to \$1500 per acre, the purchaser acquiring title to the land and 200 feet in depth of atmosphere. The upper strata, not being quite as dense, is reserved by the vender for air castles.

There is a time coming when they will have to raise something besides the price in that region to pay an interest on the investment, and the owner interested parties realize the fact the better for all concerned except the middle men. I would not be surprised if within two years some of the orchards, vineyards and orange groves that are now being cut up into streets and public squares would be replanted.

Another craze is now agitating the minds of our brethren of the south, as the saying used to be in secession times; they want State division; they must have State division. It is bound to come some time, and might as well come now. They have been abused by their brethren of the north; they have to go more than half the distance to reach the State capital. Sacramento is cold and damp in the winter. All the State-buildings are north of the bay of San Francisco. They complain of the expense of sending criminals to San Quentin and insane persons to Stockton. I think myself the authorities made a mistake in not putting the insane asylum in the southern part of the State. Newspaper reporters are going around interviewing leading citizens to get an expression of opinion on State division for their papers, and if they do not find the leading citizen, they ask the questions and answer them themselves. It is all the same; few stop to read and none to think. They all say it must come, the only diversity of opinion is, some think the movement premature. Better wait, they say, until another strata of climate is sold off, and the population increased. X. Y. Z.

Quarantine Proclamation

TERRITORY OF ARIZONA, EXECUTIVE DEPARTMENT, OFFICE OF THE GOVERNOR.

Whereas the Live Stock Sanitary Commission of the Territory have officially certified that they have reason to believe that conditions have existed and continue to exist which render animals of the bovine species from the continent of Europe and the Republic of Mexico liable to convey disease, and request a quarantine to be established against said localities.

Now, therefore, I, C. Meyer Zulick, Governor of the Territory of Arizona, by virtue of the authority of law in me vested, do hereby order, establish and declare a Quarantine, to take effect immediately, against the Continent of Europe and the Republic of Mexico, on all bovine cattle from said localities coming into the Territory of Arizona, unless they are quarantined at the ports of entry prescribed by the Rules and Regulations of the Live Stock Sanitary Commission of Arizona, for a period of NINETEEN DAYS, and retained there until they shall receive a certificate of health signed by the Veterinary Surgeon of the Territory of Arizona, or some duly authorized deputy under him.

In testimony whereof, I have hereunto set my hand and caused the Great Seal of the Territory to be hereunto affixed. Done at Prescott, the Capital, this Eighteenth day of August, A. D. 1887. C. MEYER ZULICK.
