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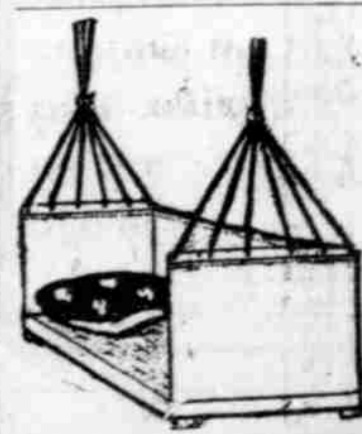

9 VICTIMS FOR DEATH CHAIR IN ONE DAY

Wholesale Execution at Sing Sing this Week: 154 Have Paid Penalty in State in 27 Years

NEW YORK, Aug. 10.—Twenty-two years ago this week, on August 6, 1890, William Kemmler, a condemned murderer, was put to death in the electric chair in Auburn prison. Kemmler was the first victim to be legally executed by electricity in the United States and his case was the subject of wide discussion at the time. The action of New York in substituting the electric chair for the gallows has been found generally satisfactory and her example has been followed by Ohio, Virginia, South Carolina, Massachusetts, Kentucky and New Jersey.

Since the execution of Kemmler there have been 154 persons put to death in the electric chair in New York. The state prison authorities estimate that it costs about \$4000 per individual to carry out the capital punishment mandate. On the basis of this estimate New York state has expended about \$65,000 for electrocutions since that form of inflicting the death penalty was introduced.

Several times the electric chair at Sing Sing has had two victims in one day, and on one occasion a short time ago three persons were put to death within a period of twenty-four hours. But never before has there been such a wholesale execution of death sentences imposed on prisoners in this state as is scheduled to take place at Sing Sing next week. Nine men are to die on the same day, and in as rapid succession as they can be led to the death chair. Six of the nine prospective victims are the Italians who were convicted of the atrocious murder of Mrs. Mary Hall at Croton Lake, Westchester County, on Nov. 9, 1911.

NEVER FIGHT WITH BURGLAR

Upset a Chair and Frighten Him Away —That Is the Advice of a City Policeman.

"Don't ever 'hunt' a burglar. Make a noise and frighten him away. Upset a chair or slam a door.

"Almost all burglars carry revolvers of the finest kind. A 'pete man' or safe blower, the most dangerous kind of criminal, usually carries an automatic revolver, as it gives the quickest action.

"Every householder should have a weapon in the house, but he should never use it unless to save his life.

"It is the inexperienced man whose use of the revolver makes it dangerous.

"A professional or expert burglar will never shoot unless to avoid capture. A safe blower will shoot at a policeman or any intruder, as for them capture means a long term in prison."

Special Officer Edward Brophy, an expert, made these statements, says the Pittsburgh Post. It is only on the very rarest occasions that he can be induced to talk about himself, but it is a fact that he is a crack shot with a pistol. He has made a study of weapons, and has a collection of them at his home ranging from little "baby hammerless" revolvers to huge Winchester rifles, a shot from which will move a heavy safe. He has always been interested in guns, and has taken special pains to learn about the guns burglars and other criminals carry.

DICTIONARY MAKERS AT FAULT

Some Notable Blunders. With Elephantine Efforts at Wit, Have Been Put on Record.

Dr. Johnson perpetrated many jokes in his dictionary, but among his most famous blunders was his definition of "pastern" as "the knee of a horse."

The dictionary makers often took occasion to make their definitions hit their enemies. Wesley defined "Methodist" as "one that liveth according to the method laid down in the Bible."

Dr. Johnson defined oats as "a grain which in England is generally sown to horses, but in Scotland supports the people." He defined "penstemon" as "a slave of state, hired by a stipend to obey his master," which definition was made much of by the doctor's enemies when he himself was awarded a pension.

Bailey's dictionary defined the Loriot or Golden Oriole as "a bird that, being looked upon by one who has the yellow jaundice, cures the person and dies himself." Pennings, who was the next dictionary maker, was afraid of this, and merely said "Loriot, a kind of bird." But one of the best bits of misinformation was given in the dictionary of Edward Phillips, who in one place declared that "a gallon is a measure containing two quarts" and in another place declared "a quaver is a measure of time in music, being the half of a crochet, as a crochet is the half of a quaver," which leaves the subject as clear as mud.

Sure Enough Primitive Town. Aden is a primitive place. Drinking and bathing water is drawn from the sea, condensed and delivered to residents in wagons at one-half cent a gallon. There is no plumbing and modern bathroom fittings are conspicuous by their absence. Washbasins are used for bathing purposes. The authorities have considered piping water into Aden from Lahaj, about thirty miles distant, but have come to no decision in the matter as yet.—London Globe.
