

HAYDEN AFTER YUMA BRIDGE

Arizona Congressman Expects Early Report from Interior Department, Will Push Measure

ARIZONA COMPLAINTS

WASHINGTON, Jan. 24.—Representative Carl Hayden is expecting a report at an early date from the interior department on his bill providing for a bridge across the Colorado river. As soon as this report is received, Mr. Hayden expects to push the measure to a favorable conclusion before the committee and then before the house.

Mr. Hayden expresses the opinion that the building of this bridge would mean much for the section directly interested and also be of material benefit generally.

Measures dealing with Indian affairs continue to be introduced in numbers and the calendar now contains many such bills. Mr. Owen has submitted an amendment to be proposed by him to the bill making appropriations for the current and contingent expenses of the bureau of Indian affairs by the insertion of a clause to the effect that the secretary of the treasury be authorized to pay from a designated fund of \$500,000 that amount to loyal Creek Indians in conformity with the award by the senate, February 16, 1902.

The Arizona Corporation Commission has filed with the interstate commerce commission two complaints, both against a number of railroads, the title of the first action being Arizona Corporation Commission vs. Atchison, Topeka & Santa Fe Railway company, Arizona Eastern Railroad company, et al., and that of the second, Arizona Corporation Commission vs. Arizona & New Mexico Railway company, Arizona Eastern Railroad company et al. There are eleven defendant railroads in the first complaint and twenty-five defendants in the second.

The first complaint charges that the defendants have fixed rates on petroleum and petroleum products, including crude oil and engine distillate, to points in Arizona which are unjust and unreasonable and which should be reduced. It asks that the defendants be required to answer the charges made, and after a hearing and investigation reasonable rates to be fixed by the commission. A table showing rates charged from Bakersfield, San Francisco and Los Angeles to twenty Arizona points, including Phoenix, is made a part of the complaint.

The second complaint charges that rates fixed by defendant carriers on grain and grain products from points in Colorado, Kansas, Iowa, Missouri, Nebraska and Oklahoma to points in Arizona are unreasonable, unjust and discriminatory. The commission asks to declare such rates unjust and to order reasonable rates fixed.

WOMEN DEFEND WIFE FROM CRAZY HUSBAND

With Pokers and Shot Gun They Bar His Way to Hysterical Spouse

TUCSON, Jan. 24.—Three women, armed with iron poker and a shot gun, defended the home of Mrs. Ingram, 2 miles north of the city on the First avenue road Wednesday night when Daniel Boone Johnson, an old woodcutter living near there, battered in the front door in an effort to reach his wife, who was ill and being cared for by Mrs. Ingram. Johnson surrendered himself to Sheriff John Nelson Thursday morning. He will be examined as to his sanity.

The trouble arose by reason of the death Wednesday of the baby recently born to Johnson and his wife on their ranch near Mrs. Ingram's. The woman is half paralyzed. Johnson is 45 years old.

Makes Sick Wife Hysterical

As the hotel where the Johnsons lived was not a suitable place for the woman to be, Mrs. Ingram, out of charity, had her transferred to her own home. Johnson is said to have caused his wife to go into hysterics every time he came near her. Finally he was refused further admittance.

Johnson sought an order from J. W. Estill of the board of supervisors to remove his wife to St. Mary's hospital. It was refused. Wednesday afternoon he appeared at the Ingram home with an ambulance and order from Dr. John Walsh, county physician, for the woman.

Johnson was put out, after bursting the lock on the door. Mrs. Ingram went for help, leaving two other women on guard with the shot gun.

Johnson drove into town with a load of wood Thursday. He surrounded himself at the courthouse. His horse and his dog are being cared for by the county pending the outcome of the case.

The baby was buried at the expense of the county.

Johnson denies breaking down the door.

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NEW ANESTHETIC IS AT C & A HOSPITAL

First Apparatus of Kind in State Has Been Installed in Bisbee

The first anesthetic apparatus to be used in the state has been received by the C. & A. hospital and is now being utilized.

The new apparatus combines the good properties of both laughing gas and ether and does away with the bad effects of each. Under the old method an anesthetic was administered wholly by one of these. The new method makes the application much safer, as the bad after effects are eliminated. By it the laughing gas is first administered and the ether is then given. The apparatus is in general use in the large hospitals in the east, where it has given full satisfaction, but the apparatus at the C. & A. hospital is the first to be put in use in this state.

EVIDENCE ON LEGAL RATES

Hearing Begins on Complaint of Railroads Lodged with Interstate Commission

RAILROADCONTENTION

PHOENIX, Jan. 24.—Before Examiner G. S. Gibson, the hearing of the Arizona corporation commission's complaint regarding rates on coal from Gallup to points in this state, filed with the interstate commerce commission, began this morning in the blue room of the Hotel Adams.

Corporation Commissioner F. A. Jones was the first witness and as will probably be on the stand most of today. The commission is also represented by Chairman W. P. Geary, Secretary Charles Smith and Rate Clerk Alex Jones.

Among the railroad men present are the following: E. W. Clark, general freight and passenger agent of the Arizona Eastern, Tucson; R. K. Minson, general traffic manager of the El Paso & Southwestern, El Paso; Eugene Fox, general freight agent of the E. P. & S. W., El Paso; Paul P. Hastings, assistant freight traffic manager of the Santa Fe, San Francisco; E. P. Cruise, general freight and passenger agent of the S. F. P. & P. Prescott; W. G. Barnwell, district general freight agent of the Santa Fe, Los Angeles; J. J. Coleman, assistant general freight agent of the Santa Fe, Chicago; J. L. Coleman, attorney for the Santa Fe, Chicago; E. W. Camp, attorney for the Santa Fe, Los Angeles; J. G. Wilson, interstate commerce attorney of the Southern Pacific, Chicago; J. G. Stubbs, general freight agent of the Southern Pacific, Los Angeles; E. J. Gibson, division superintendent of the Santa Fe, Winslow; W. A. Drake, general manager of the S. F. P. & P. Prescott. In addition to these several local railroad men are in attendance.

During his testimony this morning Commissioner Jones was asked many leading questions. Once Examiner Gibson had to inform the railroad attorneys that Mr. Jones was not yet under cross examination.

Commissioner Jones took up the complaint filed with the interstate commerce commission and explained it in detail. He cited many instances to show how rates on coal are raised by making the shipments through Deming and over the S. P. and E. P. of through Albuquerque, Ash Fork, Prescott and Phoenix.

"The consumer is entitled to rates based on the shortest possible haul," said the witness. He went on to show that the distance to many points is greater by way of Deming than by way of Albuquerque and Phoenix. Yet the Gallup coal is shipped over the longer route.

In several instances the rates asked for by the corporation commission are higher than those now in effect. The Phoenix & Eastern branch will receive more for hauling slack to Hayden than it receives at present, if the rates are ordered into effect.

The defense will try to show that it will cost more to haul coal over the Santa Fe lines than over the E. P. & S. W. and the S. P., because of the heavier grades.

"The Santa Fe receives more by merely hauling coal to Deming and delivering it to us there than it would receive were it to ship all the way to Phoenix over its own rails," said Mr. Clapp just before the hearing opened.

ASSOCIATED BOARDS STATE SUPERVISORS

PHOENIX, Jan. 24.—Lin B. Orme, secretary of the Associated Boards of Supervisors of Arizona, will send out notices tomorrow for a meeting of the organization in this city on February 10.

The purpose of the gathering is to formulate legislation to be recommended at the coming session of the lawmakers. The most important among these matters will be the drafting of a bill for a bond issue for roads which has been proposed by Mr. Orme.

"Three months ago," said Mr. Orme today, "we met and discussed what legislation we would bring before the body. At our February meeting we will go further with these matters and ascertain exactly what matters we will submit."

It is not exactly known where the meeting will be held, though probably at the capitol building. W. A. Moerr, chairman of the Maricopa county board of supervisors is also chairman of the state organization.
