North Woods Drama Will Be Shown at Eagle on Thursday

The big outdoors is the background for the newest story in which Frank Mayo is starred. "The Red Lane," announced for next Tuesday and Wednesday at the Central theatre and Thursday at the Eagle theatre. It is the work of Holman Day, whose tales of the Maine north woods have thrilled the readers of the printed page as well as the patrons of the drama. It is directed by Lynn Reynolds, who has established himself as a master of open-air photoplays by producing such masterpieces as "The Brute Breaker," "Overland Red" and "Bullet Proof."

Its scenes laid on the Canadian border, where the smugglers carry on their nefarious traffic and look upon the law and order as their natural enemy. "The Red Lane" is rich in dramatic incident, the thrill of physical combat, the lure of the prize and the romance of a young French-Canadian girl and an American customs officer. Frank Mayo has the latter role, finding himself the enemy of Vetal Beaulieu, a ring leader among the lawless, and in love with Beaulieu's pretty daughter, who had been reared in a convent, unaware of the character of her father or his associates. When she discovers her father's occupation and that he had promised her in marriage to Dave Rol, chief of the smuggling crew, she openly rebels and runs away from home.

In "The Red Lane" Frank Mayo is supported by Lillian Rich as Marie; Jean Hersholt as her brutal father; James Mason as the young leader of the contraband ring; Paul Weigel as the Arcadian priest; Karl Formes as a wandering musician; Frank Thorne as an unscrupulous politician; Margaret Mann as the pater's housekeeper; James O'Neill as a half-witted sheep herder and by a half hundred others, all selected for their especial fitness for the roles to be portrayed.

company. The liquor was shipped and its seizure was followed by the arrest of Sadler, who was later released on bond.

Shipped from New York after Sadler's arrest, he is said to have proceeded to New York and given information to the authorities there relative to the operation of eastern distillers. He is said to have declared that outlaw liquor valued at millions of dollars was shipped from New York, Pittsburgh into Chicago.

"I saw a restaurant man one day and we began talking about the whisky business," Sadler is quoted as saying. "He asked me why I didn't get into the business. He said there was a chance for a quick fortune. He told me I could get a permit if I went to the offices of Booth and Edwards, insurance men."

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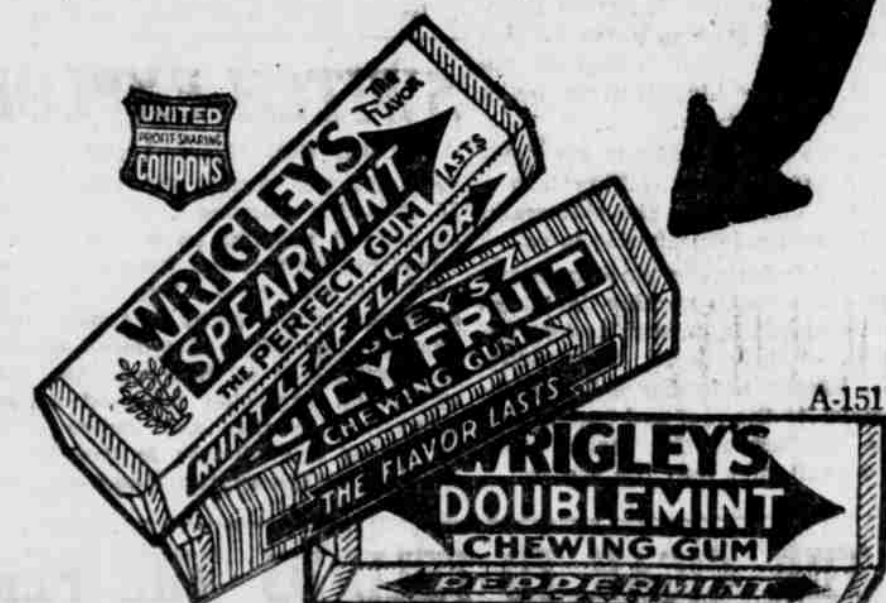
