Mr. Nemeck said the fire still was smouldering and probably would burn in a subdued fashion for several days. He stated the front walls of two three-story buildings, all that was left of them after the fire, were being torn down by blasting and by pulling over with ropes.

Already there is talk of rebuilding the burned structures, according to Judge Jack.

TEXAS PLANS TO SHIP ITS COTTON TO EUROPE ABEILENE, Texas, Oct. 13.—A committee of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce today decided upon a plan whereby approximately 15,000 bales of low grade cotton now in the hands of West Texas farmers would be shipped to Europe for market. The cotton is to be pooled and prepared for shipment by a local cotton concern with European connections. The cotton would be stored in Europe should there be no ready market upon its arrival there.
