

CHAMPS IN FIVE TENNIS EVENT ARE DECIDED

Tilden-Richards Win From Williams and Washburn in Doubles Matches

BOSTON, Aug. 27.—National champions at lawn tennis in five classes were decided on the courts of the Longwood Cricket Club today.

Outstanding in importance and actual play was the match in which William T. Tilden, II, world's singles title, and Vincent Richards, little more than a boy, regained the national doubles crown. Largely through the brilliance of Richards, they administered the defeat of the season to the eastern doubles champions, R. Norris Williams, II, and W. M. Washburn, regarded as America's probable defenders in doubles in the Davis Cup match with Japan. The straight set scores, 13-11, 12-10, 6-1, constituted the greatest number of games in three sets in the history of the event.

Tilden, paired with a boy, was able to do more than Tilden paired with the national woman's champion, Mrs. Molla Mallory. Both were off their game in the national mixed doubles championship final, in which they were defeated by the western pair, Miss Mary K. Browne and William Johnston. After the two champions had won the first set, 6-3, Miss Browne's placements pulled out the next two sets for her team, 6-4, 6-3.

Johnston's contribution to the success was less than that of his partner. Young Vincent Richards succeeded where Tilden failed in the quest for double honors, adding the national junior singles championship to his list for the third year, after a hard tussel with Arnold W. Jones of Providence. It was a straight set victory, 6-3, 7-5, 9-7, but it was difficult for Richards to compete because of his weariness.

The national junior doubles title was won by Jones and W. W. Ingraham, whose fathers won the veterans championship previously. The father and son honors went for a third year to the Andersons of New York, Fred G., and his son, Fred G.

BOB AND FAY — BUDDIES! THEY'LL FIGHT AGAIN

BALTIMORE, Aug. 23.—"Over the top again."

Bob Martin, who won the heavyweight championship of the A. E. F., by knocking out Ray Keiser, Cumberlan, Md., in the finals at the Cirque de Paris in 1919, will attempt to repeat the performance for the benefit of the old comrades of khaki days when they met here September 3.

The occasion is "Buddie Week," nearly 100,000 ex-service men are expected in the city during the reunion.

While the "Buddie Week" program is sporadic throughout, the one big event is the Martin-Keiser fight, which will be staged in a big armory seating 12,000 persons.

There will be track meets, relay races, boxing tournaments and other sporting events.

Invite Harding

Spike Webb, who retreated overseas and who was coach of the triumphant Olympic boxing team, is chairman of the committee promoting the Martin-Keiser fight.

Invitations have been sent to President Harding, Secretary of War Weeks and his assistant, Wainwright, Secretary of the Navy Denby and his assistant, Roosevelt, General Pershing and staff, and other army officials.

Many of the men from Maryland, West Virginia, Pennsylvania, Delaware and New Jersey, who saw service overseas, were present when Martin and Keiser met in Paris. Some rooted for Keiser and felt that the decision should have been a draw.

Keiser is a wealthy young farmer of near Cumberland, Md., and he doesn't have to fight for a living.

But he does want to whip Bob Martin.
