Carl Morris will referee. The fight is under the auspices of the American Legion and is the costliest ever brought here. California's best welterweight will meet the pick of the Arizona crop when Salinas Jack Robinson steps into the ring with Kid Palmer at the Tally arena tonight. Phoenix fans who have been watching the career of Robinson as he downed one after another of his opponents on the coast will have an opportunity to see him at his best. He met the Arizona Wildcat while on the coast and came out of the fray with a draw. Both boys are determined that the event tonight will not be a draw.

Although an Arizona product, Kid Palmer has made a big reputation for himself on the coast and is considered a fast corner for the welterweight belt. He met the best of his weight while on the coast and the poorest showing he made was with Robinson in the draw battle. The rest of them either toppled over for the count or stuck it out to a losing finish.

The Kid's first appearance here against Johnny Celmers last September when he easily won the decision, marked his first big battle. Although he is only 20 years old he has already developed into one of the best boys of his weight.

Because the purse is one of the largest ever offered here for any similar event and will be divided 60 per cent to the winner and 40 per cent to the loser, fans are assured of a fast go from start to finish. Both boys can hand out terrific wallops with either the right and left and can inflict some powerful body blows from short range. The doctors are taking great interest in the fact that both are strong fighters. Not only do they compare closely in their style but in every other manner they are evenly matched. They will weigh in at 155 pounds or forfeit \$200.

Kewpie Robinson is a battler, a fighter who bores in much the same way as did Battling Nelson. The Kid is a good boxer and heavy slugger. He is one of the fastest of his weight that ever drew on a padded mitt.

Dynamite Kid Coming
Fight fans are eager to see Battling Scotty mix it up with Mack Spaw in the semi-finals. Their bout is attracting almost as much interest as the main go. Scotty has fought his way into the hearts of the local sporting element because of his readiness to meet all comers and fight as though he were after a million dollar purse. Scotty stands right up to any of them and swaps blows with lightning rapidity. He has never failed to give the fans a run for their money. In meeting Spaw he is going to be kept busy every second of the six rounds. Spaw takes blows like a duck takes water and hands out sledge hammer blows that are hard to dodge.

Wildcat Ellis Coming
Wildcat Ellis just put the kaxo to Holguin at Globe and is rarin' to repeat the performance when he meets Billy Alger in a six rounder. Alger was scheduled to meet Young Nugent but when the Wildcat made his remarkable showing at Globe, Billy clamored for a chance to go after the bigger game. Billy is in great shape and is confident he will come out of the match with flying colors. There won't be all the science in the world displayed in this

fight but when it comes to slugger both boys will be there with four whirling padded gloves.

Battling Sam and Kid Busso will furnish the curtain raiser and although the match is only scheduled for four rounds each one of the boys is determined to cut it still shorter with a sleep producing wallop.

There are a few good seats left at Doyle's cigar stand and the first ones there will get them. From the advance sale indications of a record crowd at this feature card is assured.

DUDLEY W. WINDES RESIGNS POST OF LEGION ADJUTANT

TEMPE, Aug. 13.—Following the return of delegates of the William Globe post, American Legion, from the department convention held in Globe Monday and Tuesday of this week, it was announced yesterday that Dudley W. Windes, of Tempe, for the past year department adjutant, has resigned and will not fill that position through the coming term. Mr. Windes expects to leave today on his vacation and will relinquish control of the adjutant's office as soon as he returns and a successor is appointed.

Prof. E. A. Row, J. H. Moeur and Mr. Windes, who represented the Tempe post at the department convention, returned from Globe Wednesday night. Following the business sessions on Monday and Tuesday, the three delegates shared in the festivities at the Roosevelt dam Wednesday, given in honor of the visitors by the Globe and Miami posts. Robert Finch, commander of the Tempe post, who was also a delegate to the convention, remained in Globe for a few days and will pass the last of this week in the Gila valley. He expects to return to Tempe the forepart of next week.

Though Mr. Windes tendered his resignation as department adjutant, he will continue as one of the department officials. At the election of officers in Globe on Tuesday, Mr. Windes was selected as the Maricopa county member of the executive committee of the department. The vacancy in the adjutant's office will be filled, it is thought, at the first meeting of the executive committee.

Mr. Windes expects to leave today with his wife on their summer vacation which will include a motor trip to the coast and through northern California to the Yosemite valley.

NEW FIRE STATION FORMALLY ACCEPTED BY CITY OF MESA

MESA, Aug. 12.—Thoroughly up-to-date and modern in every respect, the new fire station for Mesa, the first of the series of new buildings to comprise the proposed city civic center, was formally accepted by the common council at a meeting yesterday. W. L. Samuels and Son did the work on the station, the total cost to the city amounting to \$3703.67.

The two-story new building is located on the city property on North Macdonald street, adjoining the city hall on the south, and is one of the most handsome fire stations to be found in the state. The lower floor is arranged for the accommodation of two engines and all of the other necessary fire fighting equipment, while the second story is given over to sleeping and living quarters for the men. The fire engine has already been moved into its new home, and the men will occupy their new quarters shortly.

The new fire station was constructed by the city at a saving of approximately \$2500, according to contract figures submitted at the time the building was contemplated and the actual cost price figures. The total cost of the structure, including the contractor's fee of \$1000, was \$3703.67, while the lowest contract bid entered was for \$12,300.

Arrested for Shooting Quail
Charged with shooting quail out of season, Bryan Akers of Phoenix was arraigned before Justice Newell in the local precinct court yesterday afternoon and put up \$150 cash bond, pending the hearing of his case, which has been set for next Monday. Charges were preferred against Akers the latter part of last month by State Game Warden Joe Prochaska, according to local officers, for shooting quail near McDowell. Akers pleaded not guilty to the charge.
