

INDEPENDENCE DAY OF MEXICO WILL BE OBSERVED SEPT. 15

Independence Day of Mexico will be observed here by a two days' program September 15 and 16. A committee of Mexican business men is already working on a program which promises to be as attractive as it is varied.

A literary program has been arranged for the night of September 15 at the home of a Mexican social club 805 South Fifth street. Several men prominent in the social and political life of this state and who have shown a broad understanding of the relations which should exist between the United States and Mexico have been asked to address the meeting. The national hymn of Mexico will be sung by a chorus of female voices. Following the program there will be dancing.

Arrangements are under way to secure the school house grounds on South Fifth street for a program of sports and games September 16. Events for this day will include all the well known pastimes such as the potato race, climbing the greased pole, peanut race and real athletic contests. A big display of pyrotechnics is being arranged as the grand finale.

The sanction and promise of cooperation in staging the celebration has been given by the chamber of commerce and several civic bodies and local clubs. An attempt was made to secure the Nogales band and a delegation from the border city here for the program, but new railroad rulings on excursion rates made this inadvisable. It is probable that the Indian School band will provide the music.

DOG OWNERS MUST OBTAIN LICENSES

There will be no more peddling of dog licenses in Phoenix, is the announcement made by Humane Officer Canning. It has been the practice of Mr. Canning since he undertook the regulation of the dog license business to go around to owners of dogs and warn them of the necessity of buying licenses, and he always had some with him for distribution. But no warning

will now be given. All dogs found running at large without license tags will be taken up and unless the owner calls to redeem the animal and pay a "pick up" charge the dog will be given away. The 1919-20 licenses expired on July 1 and licenses for 1920-21 must now be secured if one wants his ownership of his dog made secure.

There is a great demand for dogs, so great that there are few on the streets any longer. Any kind of a dog can be given away. Many are taken by tourists who are passing through the country. After every robbery or other out-lawry in the outskirts of the city there is a demand upon the humane officer for dogs. He says that he can find a home for every unlicensed dog in Phoenix.

Another thing of which announcement is made is that there is no age limit as to licenses. Many people suppose that the license is unnecessary until the dog is six months old. But the license is required as soon as a dog is old enough and he old enough when he arrives at the age when he becomes a nuisance when running at large, and a dog at six months is apt to be more of a nuisance than he is when he arrives at the age of some discretion.

GILA BEND, Sept. 3.—With the coming of the cool nights the trapping season has opened for the boys of Gila Bend. Several of the trappers have already started to work, while others expect to begin operations in a week or two. The furs are not as good now as they will be in mid-winter, but if they are properly cured they will find a good market. Some of the animals that were caught in this vicinity last year were swifs, grey foxes, coyotes, lynx, wild cats, bobcats, coons, badgers, skunks and an occasional wolf.

REGISTRATION FOR PRIMARY IN STATE PLACED AT 80,000

That approximately 80,000 Arizonans have registered for the primary election next Tuesday and the general election on November 2 is shown by the totals of county registration as received by the secretary of state up to yesterday. These totals are complete for all the state with the exception of Greenlee and Pinal counties.

The complete total for 12 counties, excluding Greenlee and Pinal, as announced yesterday, come to 72,972. Greenlee county, incomplete, has 2,464, and Pinal county, also incomplete, has 2,475, making a grand total of 77,911.
