

LITHUANIANS OPEN ARTILLERY ATTACK ON POLISH SECTOR

Conflicting Reports from Heated Sector Place Responsibility for Attack With Lithuanians

WARSAW, Sept. 5.—An attack on Polish forces by the Lithuanians with machine guns and artillery in the region of Seiny, 35 miles northwest of Grodno, is announced in Polish reports from the northern front. The reports declare the attack was unprovoked and that the Lithuanians had received orders to occupy Augustow.

FORMER AMERICAN ARMY LIEUTENANT DIES IN COBLENZ

COBLENZ, Sept. 4.—The body of Nathaniel P. Davis of Duluth, Minn., formerly a lieutenant in the American army, and recently an American citizen representative with the senate committee investigating the situation, is continuing to refrain from regarding the present demonstrations too gravely, retaining confidence in the good sense of the workers and the conciliatory spirit of the employers.

COX AGAIN OFFERS LEAD IN CAMPAIGN SLUSH FUND PROBE

Italian Metal Workers Seize Several Plants

TERENCE MACSWINEY PASSES 24TH DAY OF HIS HUNGER STRIKE

LONDON, Sept. 4.—Terence MacSwiney, lord mayor of Cork, entered the twenty-fourth day of his hunger strike in Brixton prison today after a fairly restful night. His brother, Sam MacSwiney, remained at the bedside all night.

ELEVEN PRISONERS ON 26-DAY HUNGER STRIKE IN IRELAND

BELFAST, Sept. 5.—The 11 hunger strikers in the Cork jail today entered the twenty-sixth day of their abstinence from food, having subsisted only on water. The condition of Michael O'Leary is critical and he is unable to speak to visitors. The other ten men have gone without food for a record for Irish prisoners. The longest previous hunger strike lasted 23 days.

GERMAN SOCIALISTS CRITICIZE SOVIETS

BERLIN, Sept. 3.—Soviet Russia was unfavorably criticized by speakers who addressed the party conference of the independent socialists which met today to discuss the Moscow Internationale. "Whatever our sentiments toward the Russians may be, the fact remains that they are able to establish socialism in their country," one speaker told the crowd, who has just returned from Russia.

JAPANESE ASK FREE HAND IN KOREA AND CHINA BETTERMENT

TOKYO, Sept. 5.—Marquis Okuma in receiving the party of visiting American congressmen today asked that Japan be given a free hand in Korea and China, where her intentions, he said, were directed toward the betterment of conditions. Sixty years had elapsed without the unification of the civilizations of the east and the west since Marco Polo's discovery of the route to the Indies, he was convinced eventually that would materialize.

NEW JOURNAL IN GENEVA

GENEVA, Sept. 5.—A new journal, with a policy of open opposition to the league of nations, will attempt publication in Geneva in November when the first meeting of the league is to be held here. The project is being sponsored by intellectuals of various countries who are against the treaty of Versailles.

NEWSPAPERS CONSOLIDATE

MANILA, Sept. 5.—The Philippines Herald, an English language morning newspaper, has purchased the Cable News America. The price announced was \$100,000. The papers consolidated will be published hereafter as The Philippine Herald.

AIR MAIL ROUTE ESTABLISHED BY POSTAL SERVICE STARTS SEPT. 8

WASHINGTON, Sept. 5.—Air mail service between New York and San Francisco will be inaugurated by the postoffice department Wednesday. The first planes will leave each terminus at 5:30 a. m. local time.

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ANTI-SUFFRAGISTS OUTLINE FOUR WAYS TO TEST NEW LAW

WASHINGTON, Sept. 5.—Four methods to be used by anti-suffragists to bring about a decision by the supreme court before the November election, the locality of ratification of the federal suffrage amendment, were outlined in a statement issued today by the American Constitutional league.

STRIKING TOBACCO WORKERS RETURN TO WORK IN MEXICO

MEXICO CITY, Sept. 5.—Striking mill men and tobacco workers in the federal district of the State of Mexico have returned to work in conformity with an agreement made with the provisional president, who has promised his efforts to settle the dispute.

GEORGE ENDS LUCERNE VISIT

LUCERNE, Sept. 5.—The visit of Premier Lloyd George to Lucerne ended today. Accompanied by his suite of 24 persons, the premier left on a special train for Zermatt, from where he will continue his journey direct to London. The exact date of his home-coming has not been made public, owing, it is said, to an increase in the number of threatening letters and telegrams received by the premier, which has led to fears that an attack upon him might be attempted en route.

EPISCOPAL CONFERENCE

ST. LOUIS, Sept. 5.—A call for a conference of the house of bishops of the Episcopal Church of America here Oct. 27 was issued tonight by Daniel S. Tuttle, presiding bishop. Elections to fill several vacancies existing will come before the meeting.

GERMANY APOLOGIZES

BERLIN, Sept. 5.—Dr. Walter Simon, foreign minister, accompanied by Herr Severing of the Prussian ministry, called at the French embassy today and expressed the government's anxiety for the recent incident in France during which a mob attacked the French consulate.

Submarine S-5 Again Anchors On Sea Bottom

Leased Wire] PHILADELPHIA, Sept. 5.—The Chilean submarine S-5, which was given a holiday today, before leaving the navy yard to visit their friends they offered to do a "crash" dive to prove, they said, that their commander was not to blame for the accident. One member of the crew went to New York to see his wife and a baby that was born whilst his father was held prisoner under the surface of the ocean. Three of the thirty-five survivors were still in the navy hospital tonight, but they were reported to be on the way to recovery.

STATE DEPARTMENT WILL NOT PROTEST MACSWINEY ARREST

NEW YORK, Sept. 5.—Peter J. MacSwiney, brother of the lord mayor of Cork, tonight made public a copy of a letter which he had received from the state department at Washington, setting forth that it was "not in a position to make protestations to the British authorities" against the lord mayor's arrest. Mr. MacSwiney had requested the state department to intervene in his brother's behalf.

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SENATOR EDGE SAYS HAYS DID NOT LIE TO FUND COMMITTEE

J., Sept. 5.—United States Senator Edge of New Jersey, a member of the senate committee investigating campaign funds, gave out a transcript today of the evidence of Will H. Hays before the senate committee at Chicago which showed that Hays admitted the existence of a campaign "quota" fund.

ALABAMA STRIKE TO BE CALLED WEDNESDAY

HARDING DENIES HE FAVORS SEPARATE PEACE WITH HUNS BUT INSISTS THAT PENDING TREATIES MUST BE AMENDED

WASHINGTON, Sept. 5.—President Harding tonight made public a statement in which he declared that he had no intention of negotiating a separate peace with Germany. He insisted that the pending treaties must be amended to conform with the principles of the league of nations.

GENERAL OBREGON CARRIES JUAREZ BY BIG MAJORITY

JUAREZ, Mexico, Sept. 5.—Gen. Alvaro Obregon, candidate of the Liberal constitutionalist party, carried Juarez by an overwhelming majority in the national and state elections today. It was estimated that Robles Dominguez, candidate of the Republican party, would not receive more than 10 per cent. Gen. Ignacio Enriquez had no opposition for governor of Chihuahua. The constitutionalist party elected their delegates to congress. No disorders marked the election.

CHARGES THAT REP REPORTS FALSIFIED
