SUPERIOR JUDGE TO BE APPOINTED SOON

One of the most important appointments to be made by Governor Thos. E. Campbell the first of the year is that of superior court judge of Graham county to succeed Judge A. G. McAllister, who will become a member of the supreme bench. When Judge McAllister takes the oath of his new office there will still be two years of his unexpired term as presiding officer of the lower court of Graham county to be filled. As yet his resignation has not been received by the governor and it is believed that he will service his county until the first of the year, when he will take over his greater responsibility for the state. The successor of Judge McAllister is not known, as it is understood the governor has not yet considered the matter.

Baseball Records Moved to Chicago

Leased Wire] CHICAGO, Nov. 23—Records of the old National baseball commission have been transferred from Cincinnati to Chicago in preparation for the opening of offices here for Judge Landis as ruler of the major leagues. By a visit to Cincinnati last week Judge Landis familiarized himself with the workings of the old baseball commission and soon is to begin consideration of baseball problems. One of the first important decisions expected, according to reports, is the division of about \$15,000 among members of the White Sox team, which earned second place money in the 1920 race. Strong opposition has arisen in some quarters to the proposal to exclude from shares the seven former White Sox players under indictment for participation in "throwing" the 1919 world's series.
