86 PLAYERS TO COMPETE TODAY IN GOLF MEET

WASHINGTON, July 20.—Eighty-eight players will compete in the titular rounds of the twenty-sixth annual national open golf championship starting here tomorrow. The field includes 45 who qualified in the second half of the qualifying round today, and the 43 of yesterday—survivors of the entry list of 254 players who sought the open golfing honors in the United States.

Never in the history of the national event has a more representative list been selected for the first half of the rounds. It includes the leading American professionals, two of the British star pros, two Australian professionals and seven prominent amateurs.

If the play in today's half of the qualifying round can be taken as a criterion as to what may be expected in the championship rounds, golf of the most brilliant character is in store for the thousands of spectators who have formed galleries during the preliminary rounds.
