Many Men Given Employment On Highways Through Federal Aid

It is estimated by engineers that highways being constructed in the United States through federal aid will employ on Oct. 31 giving employment to 250,000 men, either directly on the actual road construction or indirectly in the production and transportation of materials which enter into the construction.

Seventy-five million dollars becomes available as federal aid for road construction in the various states, the money to be spent under the supervision of the bureau of public roads, department of agriculture, under the federal highway act recently passed by the president. In addition \$15,000,000 is appropriated for national forest roads.

The new act will, it is stated, keep these men at work on the roads, so far as weather conditions will permit, and thereby prevent the unemployment situation from becoming more serious.

The federal highway act in a general way resembles the federal aid act of 1915, but contains several new features. Administration of the act by the secretary of agriculture, and under him the bureau of public roads, remains unchanged.
