CHICAGO, Dec. 1.—Rains in Texas and Kansas as well as in southern Argentina had a bearish effect on wheat today. Prices closed unsettled, 1/4 to 1/8 cent lower, with December \$1.12 1/2, factor \$1.18 1/2, 1/4 cent. Corn finished 1/4 cent down to a shade advance, oats 1/4 cent down to a light upturn and provisions ranging from 5 cent loss to a gain of 2 1/2 cent. Wheat prices fluctuated rapidly, and at one time the May delivery was up to 13 cents above the recent low, but the net basis for May delivery could no longer be made so serviceable as late and the market was left without sufficient support to stand increased selling to realize profits. Reports indicated that the rains in the southwest fell mainly in sections where moisture was required. Many traders, however, were persuaded that more rains would follow, and it was only for a brief time that attention was given to estimates putting the condition of the winter crop in Texas as low as 50 to 55 per cent of normal. Bulls failed also to make any permanent headway with talk of better domestic milling demand, the smallness of receipts and the chance that Germany would give more favorable terms for paying reparations. Wet weather tended to steady corn and oats notwithstanding heavy deliveries of oats here on December contracts. Feed stuffs were generally selling above corn on a pound for pound basis.
