



KNIGHTS OF COLUMBUS HOME

OPENING K. OF C. BROADWAY HOME

Sunday afternoon the official opening of the new Knights of Columbus Home on Broadway will take place. The new home is located at 193 Broadway in the former Rawson homestead which of late years has been the residence of George C. Preston. From 2 until 10 o'clock Sunday open house will be kept. The K. of C. augmented orchestra will provide a concert programme and souvenirs will be given to both lady and gentlemen guests. The flag presentation is the only formal programme arranged for the day. A large flag pole and flag are to be presented to White Cross Council No. 13, 57th Street, and the presentation is to be made by Mayor J. J. Desmond who is a member of Rev. Daniel Mullen's Assembly.

The new home is a three-story frame building. The property has a frontage of 94 feet and a depth of 300 feet. The house has been repainted white and the entire property is now in first class condition. The inscription K. of C. appears on the entrance door. Just inside the main entrance is a large hall with hardwood floor and at the right of the hall is a reception room handsomely furnished. On one of the tables in the reception room is a hand-carved electric table lamp. The lamp was carved and given to the K. of C. by James Maloney, a member of the organization. There is also in the reception room an upright piano. The drape used throughout the lower floor are of heavy gray velour with satin lining. At the left of the hall is the library. There are also handsome mirrors donated to the K. of C. by one of the members. At the rear of the hall there is a large den furnished with the new furniture upholstered in new tapestry designs. In the den is a Sonora talking machine with a complete cabinet of records. In the rear of the den are the kitchen, laundry, parlies and store rooms. The kitchen will be equipped with a new model gas range and all modern conveniences. The staircase leading to the upper floors is of American walnut wood, highly polished. Throughout the first two floors the flooring is of hard wood. On the second floor is a large card room with seven mahogany tables, two silent seamen showcases for the sale of cigars, cigarettes and candy. The paper is a light tint in color with heavy old rose draperies. The pool room is at the left of the card room. In it are two pool tables and the cue rack. The rack is of mahogany finish and has a capacity of fifty cues. A cozy corner to be furnished with magazines and papers separates the card room from the pool room. In the rear of the card room is a modern bath room with all conveniences. At the head of the rear stairs is the directors' room. Alongside the directors' room is the cloak room with coat and umbrella racks. The third floor is devoted in part to a large study room. On this floor are

also two large store rooms. The basement is entirely of cement and contains a large boiler and several cold storage rooms. In the rear of the building is a tract of land which the committee in charge of the new home intends to use for a new building some time in the future. The lease of the rooms in the Sunlight building on Franklin street now used by White Cross Council will expire next April. After the expiration of the lease it is intended to erect another building, probably connected with the new home, this new building to be used for a gymnasium, bowling alley, assembly hall, dining room, convention and dance hall. It is also planned to have tennis courts, etc. on the new property. There is on the grounds a building which has been remodelled for four individual garages and there is room for two more garages.

The Knights of Columbus have a membership in Norwich of approximately 700. It is planned to bring the membership up to 1000 in the near future. SUBMARINE GOES ON ROCK AT HELL GATE The United States submarine R-23 limped into the port of New London early Friday morning and made her way to the submarine base, following an accident at Hell Gate, New York, Thursday morning.

For more than an hour and a half the sub hung suspended on the jagged rocks just at the northern entrance to the whitewater of Hell Gate on the Astoria shore of the East river at Lawrence Point.

This spot is just off the wharves of the Astoria, Light and Power company, but the submarine was just far enough away that the hoisting machinery on the wharf could not be used to help it out of its perilous position.

The submarine was in command of Lieut. E. D. Lee and had a crew of 30 men on board. It left the Brooklyn navy yard at about 8.30 o'clock to make a trip to New London. In passing through Hell Gate either the steering gear became disarranged or the navigator did not keep out of the dangerous currents of the gate that set in the direction of the rocks, and the submarine was carried broadside on to Lawrence Point.
