GENTLEMAN FARMER, HARDING'S AMBITION
Plans to Return to Boyhood Home After Term Is Up

Marion, O., April 5. (By Associated Press).—When he leaves the White House President Harding plans to return to the scenes of his early childhood to become a gentleman farmer and spend much of his time writing.

This was announced here today by the president's close home town friends, following his purchase yesterday of the farm in North Bloomfield township, Morrow county, where he was born. The purchase consists of 265 1/2 acres and was made by French Crow, Marion postmaster and intimate friend of the president.

Is Far From Railroads.
The original Harding farm, where the president was born consists of 185 1/2 acres and is far away from any railroad. It is a 20 mile drive from Marion. The land is described as rolling with corn the principal crop. The house in which the executive was born is still standing although in a bad state of decay. A present it is being used as a storage space for farm machinery. Whether President Harding plans to restore it is not known to his friends.

President Harding has told close friends that he expects to visit the farm in July and possibly sooner to plan improvements. Friends say that contemplated improvements include a modern bungalow and a golf course.

The farm was purchased from Harry E. Erickson who has owned it for several years and whose wife is a second cousin of the president. It immediately adjoins the quiet little village of Blooming Grove, a town of about 200 persons, where the president obtained his first schooling. The village of Blooming Grove was laid out and founded by Simon E. Harding, a great great uncle of Warren G. Harding.

Lived There Till 7.
President Harding lived on the farm until he was seven years old, when his family moved to Caledonia, in Marion county about ten miles northeast of this city.

The president's father, Dr. George T. Harding, Sr., who is a practicing physician here today told of the president's early ambition. He wanted to be a fisherman. The desire came from frequent fishing trips with his daddy in the creek running through the home farm. Intimate friends say the president never has become a good fisherman although he plays at the sport at times.

Announcement of the president's purchase developed the fact today that Dr. George T. Harding, Jr., of Columbia recently purchased the birthplace farm of his mother who was a Dickerson. The old Dickerson farm three miles south of Blooming Grove consists of 99 acres.

CREASY JURY RECALLED
New Witness Says He Heard Juror Denounce Him Before Conviction

Minneapolis, L. I. April 5.—The jury which convicted William M. Creasy on a charge of first degree murder of Edith Lavoie, the Freeport school teacher, has been subpoenaed to appear in county court here on Friday morning.

The recall of the jury is to give an opportunity to Harry Fowler, employe of a local lunchroom, to identify a member of the jury who, Fowler said in an affidavit called Creasy "a yellow cur and a degenerate," while eating lunch in Fowler's restaurant during Creasy's trial.

Counsel for Creasy has notified District Attorney Weeks of his intention to move for a new trial on the ground of newly discovered evidence, of which Fowler's affidavit is understood to be a part.

ANGERED HUSBAND SHOTS WIFE AND MAN IN THEATER
Pittsburgh Movie Patrons Thrown Into Panic When Shots Ring Out in House

Pittsburgh, April 5.—An audience of several hundred men, women and children absorbed in a screen drama at a north side playhouse was converted into a panic stricken, stampeding mob late last night when Gustave Leison, waving a revolver, stalked into an aisle in the balcony and opened fire. Seven shots were fired in rapid succession.

When the lights were switched on, a man and a woman were found slumped in their seats unconscious. The woman was Leison's wife and the man, Edward P. Weigner, her escort. Mrs. Leison was shot in the temple, back of the head, right shoulder and neck. Weigner had three wounds in his head.

Physicians said Weigner would recover but held little hope for Mrs. Leison.

Leison, whose military service record showed him to be an expert marksman, fled after the shooting but was arrested an hour later. He told police he had been "waiting for this chance for months."

WINS NEW TRIAL
Mother Succeeds in Behalf of Boy Serving 19 Years

New York, April 5.—The sentence of 19 years in Dannemora prison imposed on Mathew Kane, a former convict, in November, 1921, after he had been found guilty of first degree robbery, was set aside by General Sessions Judge McIntyre, who declared the belief that a great injustice had been done. A new trial will be ordered.

The efforts of Kane's mother, who asserted her son was home the night on which the robbery was committed, led to the setting aside of the conviction.

THINK OF WORLD PLEA.
Pope and Cardinal Gaspari Considering Protests on Execution.

TO ENFORCE PROHIBITION
Constantinople Has But Three More Days in Which to Quench its Thirst For Liquor.

Constantinople, April 5.—(By the Associated Press) — Constantinople has three more days in which to quench its thirst for the local authorities have postponed until Saturday the enforcement of the prohibition decree.

Meanwhile the streets are blocked with porters, cabs, carriages and automobiles laden with liquid cheer, which is offered at top prices. The period within which alcoholic beverages may be exported has been extended for two months.

After Saturday drinkers of liquor will be liable to 30 strokes with the bastinado while the stock of beverage dispensers will be confiscated.

DEATH TRAP IN OLD TOMB POSSIBILITY
British Press Comments on Poison That Killed Carnarvon

London, April 5.—The London press in its voluminous accounts today of Lord Carnarvon's life and death reflects the popular feeling that perhaps there really is something in the story that the ancient Egyptians set a mysterious death trap in the tombs of their rulers so as to punish by means of these sealed resting places.

Superstitious souls ever since the infection suffered by Lord Carnarvon became known have contended it was possible he was the victim of retribution. Fears of further retribution, it is suggested may deter Egyptians from touching the tomb again, but Sir Wallis Budge, keeper of Egyptian antiquities in the British museum, scoffs at this idea, saying that if the excavation enterprise continues to be financed he is sure there will be no trouble in procuring native labor as "the most powerful influence in the life of the modern Egyptian worker is money."

Sir Wallis said he had never encountered literary records suggesting that vengeance would be visited upon persons entering the tombs of Pharaohs but he added:

"Had it not been such an old tomb it might be reasonable to suppose that poison had entered Lord Carnarvon's system from the gas present in imperfect mummification."
