

CHURCHILL MADE HIS HOME RULE SPEECH IN BELFAST; ORANGEMEN DIDN'T CARRY OUT THEIR THREATS

Liberal Leader and Wife Jeered, But They Paid No Attention to Insults... 10,000 Stand in Rain Storm and Listen to Address Outlining Government's Policy Toward Ireland.

Rebellious Subjects in "Loyal" North Evidently Impressed With Government's Determination that Freedom of Speech Should Prevail in Ulster.

Orangemen Parade and Hang Churchill in Effigy, But No Armed Resistance Is Shown and Occasion Is One of Comparative Quiet.

(Special Cable Dispatch to United Press.) Belfast, Ireland, Feb. 8.—"Home Rule Day in Belfast," for which the government had made the strongest preparations in anticipation of serious riot and bloodshed, proved rather than many a Twelfth of July in recent years.

Churchill was hoisted and bisped as he passed to and from the Nationalist park where he delivered the address. He was hanged in effigy from wires suspended across a dozen leading thoroughfares, but at no time was he intimidated.

Uster did not fight. The Union leaders had been arrayed by the display of force—the Cheshire regiment, Kings own Scottish borderers, Scots rifles and Highland Light infantry, 200 mounted dragoons, and 1,000 royal Irish constabulary—and their influence was used to prevent rioting.

Thousands Hear Speech. There were 10,000 persons inside the enclosure to listen to the address while thousands of others crowded about the park. A heavy downpour of rain dampened the spirits of all concerned.
