JENNE CAVALIER DIES

WIFE OF JOHN CAVALIER PROBATED

Unmourned save by a few strangers, unwept by anyone, Jennie Cavalieri, whose eventful life ended in a ghastly murder in Oroonoke a week ago tonight, went to her final resting place this afternoon.

They stipulated that their names must not be linked with the unfortunate woman, and they sought to interest Father De Toro.

Owing to the circumstances of the woman's death, Father De Toro could not perform a requiem mass, but he had been impossible under the regulations of the church, to grant the woman burial with the honors of the Catholic church.

Father De Toro said he could officiate at a simple service in the undertaking parlors of the Catholic church, under the conditions and the women communicated their plans to Funeral Director Richards who acted accordingly. These women contributed a considerable sum towards defraying the expenses of the burial.

A few curious persons, mostly women, began to congregate in the undertaking parlors. All day long there had been a stream of humanity filing past the casket viewing the remains. Occasionally one more devout than another had stopped a moment to gaze at the body.

Following only by a single hack, containing the porters, the remains of the dead woman were taken to the Catholic cemetery. Father De Toro did not go to the grave. Several curious people gathered in the cemetery, and the body was lowered into the grave without any delay.
