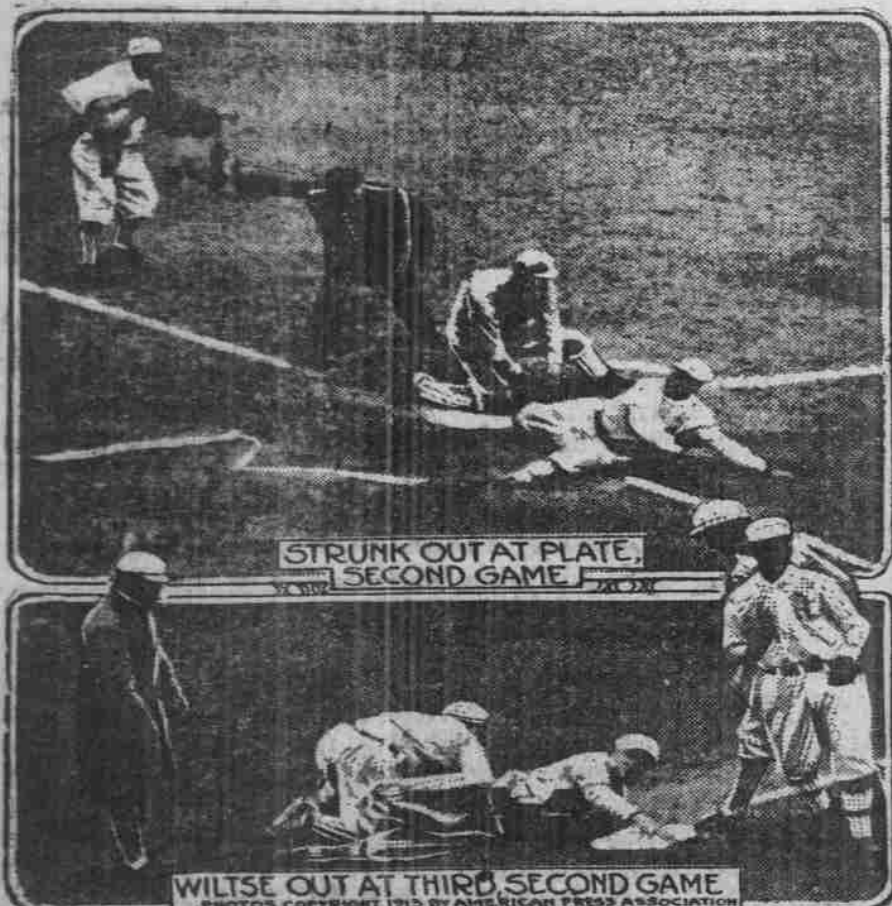


**STRUNK SNUFFED OUT AT PLATE

**BITTER ATTACK
BY PAPER OVER
RUSSIAN COURT**

Kiev, Russia, Oct. 19—A sensation was caused here today, by an article in the conservative and anti-Semitic newspaper Kievlianin, assailing in the strongest terms the court trying Mehd-Belliss on the charge of murdering Andrew Yushinsky, Christian boy of Kiev, in March, 1910. The newspaper, which usually sells at two cents, fetched \$1.50 a copy today.

The newspaper, besides attacking the court and the public prosecutor, tears the indictment against Belliss to shreds in terms which would be surprising even in the most radical journals.

The article deprecates the decision of the prosecution to appear before the whole world with such an outfit, adding: "The tribunal must not be an instrument of the right or the left. Justice will not produce the desired fruits. However advantageous or necessary it may be from a party standpoint to prove the existence of a ritual of murders, the prosecution ought not to have and has not the right to undertake the supplying of the living object indispensable for a trial of this kind."

"It is a monstrous theory that Belliss is of no account and may even be acquitted, providing that the ritual is established. You who are always talking of rituals yourselves are offering human sacrifice. Belliss may be insignificant. Nevertheless you have no right to imprison him unless you are convinced of his guilt. You have treated him like a rabbit on the table of a scientist. The time, perhaps, will come when Chaplinsky (the public prosecutor of the Kiev court) will be replaced by someone apterous to produce the incense of outraged against the Jews. What would you say if the choice fell on you for such a sacrifice?"

New York, Oct. 16—Herrmann Casar Von Post, senior member of the firm of Oerlachs & Co., New York agents of the North German Lloyd Steamship Co., died today at his residence here. Mr. Von Post was 85 years old.

**\$400,000 BLAZE
AT FLOWER MILL**

Kansas City, Mo., Oct. 16—Fire, early today, destroyed the six story building of the Southwestern Milling Co., of Kansas City, Kans., and the mill's power plant, a short distance away. All the employees have not yet been accounted for, early today, and the fire officials said only a search of the ruins, when the heat subsides, would determine if there had been loss of life. The property loss was estimated at \$400,000. The mill had a capacity of three thousand barrels of flour and employed 400 men.

**WORKMAN KILLED BY
NEW HAVEN TRAIN**

New Haven, Oct. 16—Carmel D'Adamo, aged 30, was struck and killed by a train on the Northampton branch of the New Haven road this morning, while on his way to work, in company with Antonio Dedada. The latter was hit but not seriously hurt. They were walking the tracks. D'Adamo had one arm cut off, was otherwise injured and died within a few moments after being hit.

**Prince Of Monaco
After Big Game**

Cody, Wyo., Oct. 16—The Prince of Monaco, who has been hunting in the big game sections of Wyoming for several weeks with Col. W. F. Cody as guide and host, has had his heart set on getting a bear ever since the hunt began, and today came near it, when he got a shot at a huge grizzly. The bear scented the hunters just as the prince fired, and made for the bushes. The prince's bullet clipped off the end of the bear's short tail, but did not wound the animal so that the hunting party could catch up with it. On the hunt yesterday the prince landed a fine seven-point elk on Bear Creek.

**HOOKS WILTSE PINCH
FIRST SACKER OF GIANTS**

George (Hooks) Wiltse, who made good with a vengeance at first base for the Giants Wednesday, is the veteran southpaw of the New York club. He was born in Hamilton, N. Y., September 8, 1880. He played his first professional ball with Albany, second of the New York State league in 1900. Previous to that he was with independent teams that played around Northern New York. In 1902 he joined the Scranton club in the Pennsylvania league, remaining there but one month when the league quit. He finished the season with Troy and again signed with the same club in 1903, playing in every position with the exception of catcher. In the fall of 1903 he was drafted by the New York club. He pitched portions of two games in the 1911 series with Philadelphia, but did not figure in last season's series with Boston.
