FEWER LICENSES ISSUED IN 1913

Despite Increase in County's Population There Are Less Saloons — Report of County Commissioners.

Although the population of this county has increased during the last year the number of liquor licenses has decreased by 14 during the same period. This information was gleaned from the report of the county commissioners issued today by Secretary Simeon Pease.

The receipts of the county during the year amounted to \$284,561.14. There was a decrease in receipts in comparison with 1912, due to the fact that the county tax was one-fifteenth of one mill instead of one-tenth.

The amount of money distributed to the different towns and cities from the license funds was as follows: Bridgeport, \$13,357.30; Stamford, \$32,629.93; Newtown, \$2,070; Huntington, \$5,400; Fairfield, \$4,264.25; New Canaan, \$2,610; Darien, \$1,881; Westport, \$3,785; Brookfield, \$270; Stratford, \$4,516.25; Bethel, \$21,600; Danbury, \$21,330; Greenwich, \$14,205.15.

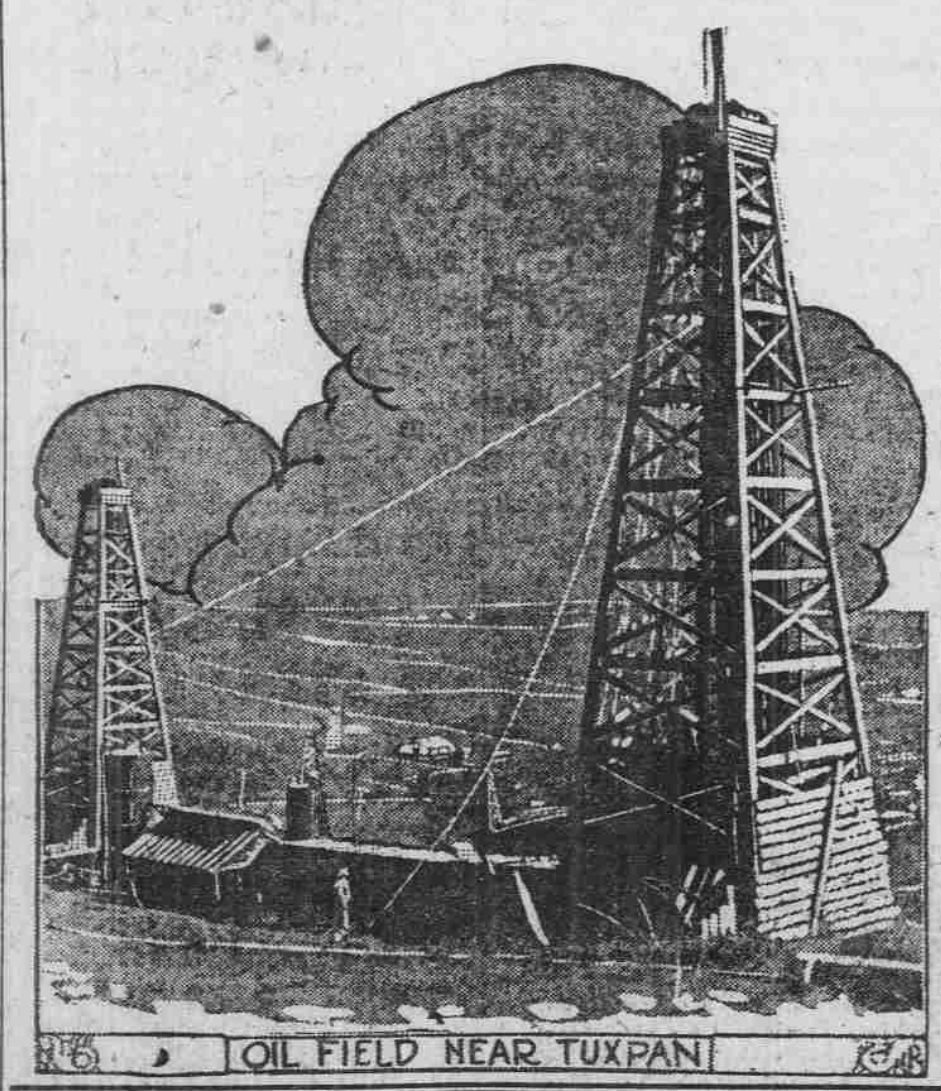

Hartford, Nov. 24.—James Cherry, 32, colored, was today remanded for trial at the coming term of the United States court which opens in this city next Tuesday on a charge of robbing the mails. His hearing was before Deputy Clerk Richard F. Carroll, sitting as a federal commissioner.

Cherry has been employed as a porter in the Hartford postoffice since 1903. He was detected in his stealings by means of decoy letters and marked bills. He was arrested Sunday after two letters so marked were missing and the bills were found in

his clothing in the porter's room at the office. He then admitted that he had been pilfering the mails for nine months.

With Giovanni Curtis, alleged embezzler and missing "bandmaster" of prospective Italian bands in Bridgeport, Torrington and Norwalk, expected to land in France sometime tomorrow, police officials are pushing plans to try and have him arrested and returned to this country. The proceeding today is to have warrants issued in the three places and then notify the Italian counsel at New York and the federal authorities.

—Grave doubts concerning the recovery of John Jankura, Arctic explorer, who was one of the victims in yesterday morning's stabbing affray, are being expressed this afternoon at Bridgeport hospital. There are indications that the slaying of his lieutenant, one of the lunge, James Gynsky, the other victim, is reported as being in a satisfactory condition.
